Clergymen are to vote as freehold-ers, and in tewns, householders paying, or inhabiting houses worth 101. a year, are to have votes. Freehouses worth 101. a year, are to have votes Free-holders are to retain their right to vote. There will be three classes of voters, namely, freeholders of 201. 101, and 40s. The poll in towns to be limited to two 10), and 40s. The poll in towns to be limited to two days, and in counties there are to be fifteen polling place-, not more than 606 votes to be taken in one place. By this bill there will be a complete destruc-tion of that exclusiveness which prevails. In nearly all the large towns the number of freemen was limit-ed to 13.
