MISSING VESSEL.—The schr. Wellington, 95 tons, owned and
sailed by Samuel Cowdell, and bound from Windsor to Eastport,
left the former place on or about the 6th Dec. last, and was passed

The master of the latter vessel was hailed—the master of the
Wellington, and informed that his vessel was in a sinking condi-

The brig Clarence, Capt. Morris, of this port, bound to Trini-
dad, was totally lost, with her cargo, in the Second Bocas, on the
night of the 12th ult. Every exertion was made to keep the ves-
sel clear, but a strong current with but little wind, swept her
against the rocks; the anchor was let go; but owing to the great
depth of water would not hold.

The Schooner Ann, of Pictou, from Sydney for this place, has
also been lost—Crew saved.

DREADFUL SHIPWRECK.—A Shipwreck of a most melancholy
description, attended by an immense loss of human life, occurred
near Cape Ray, on the coast of Newfoundland, on the night of the
19th ultimo.

The Ship Lady Sherbrooke, 377 tons burthen, Henry Gambles,
Master, owned at Newcastle, from Londonderry bound to Quebec,
with 285 passengers, and a crew of 15 persons, sailed on the 4th
June from Londonderry—nothing occurred until the night of the
19th July, when, at twelve o'clock, one of the seamen called out
from the fore-castle that there were rocks on the lee bow. Instantly
all was confusion on board, those below rushed upon deck—an
attempt was made to tack the ship, but the wind was so light, and
the ground swell so great, that it failed—the ship backed on the
rocks, and in less than ten minutes was completely broken up. A
scene of the most harrowing description then took place—Three
Hundred human beings were struggling for existence.—The boats,
filled with people, were upset in the surf, and the few saved, the
Captain, Mate, 3 seamen, and 27 passengers, clung to part of the
wreck, or were fortunately cast by the waves on some cliff.—At
twelve o'clock next day they were discovered by some Fish-
ermen, who went to their relief, and conveyed them to Bass Har-
bour, from whence they were brought to this port in the schooner
Pomona, Capt. Munro.

It is stated in the N. York Journal of Commerce, that on Sun-
day morning last, at early flood, a letter-bag, with a bottle of spirits
of turpentine lashed to it, probably to buoy it, floated alongside
brig Rodney, lying at quarantine. In it were about 300 letters
and papers much chafed, many directed Nova Scotia and New-
Brunswick; some Kingston (Jam.) papers of June 28.—The in-
ference is that a British vessel from Jamaica for Halifax has been
lost at sea.—Boston Patriot.

The barque Lord Whitworth Thornton, 28 days from London,
to Rodger Dean & Co. in ballast, was wrecked on Bic Island the
16th inst. Captain Thornton has come up to Quebec for assistance,
having left the mate and crew in charge of the wreck.
Sailed to day—the Thomas Ritchie, which stranded last fall
below, and being taken to Gaspe was brought up here this
spring.—Quebec pap.
