The Marquis of Blandford moved an address in the House of Commons, in amendment to the Ministerial answer to the King's Speech; the boldnesss of its language-its clear conceptions of the state of the country-and the means it suggests for the removing of its present grievances, makes it a document of the highest value. [We give below the melascholy intelligence of the murder of Mr Charles Burns, in the environs of Liverpool. Mr B. resided a short time during the yeur 1826, in Richibucto and this place, and was highly esteemed for his gentlemanly deportment.

On Saturdav night hast, about eight o'clock, an atrocious murder attended with an attempt at robbery, was percetrated on the road to Tewbrook, near this town. The gentleman who has lost his life by this act of violence is Mr. Charles Burns, of the firm of M'Gan and Burns, wine-merchants, Exchangestreet. East. On the night in question he was returning along the West Derby road, to his house at Jewbrook, when, on arriving opposite the end of Everron-lune, which lies a few hundred yards beyond the Necropolis, a man-rushed from the hedge, and presented a pistol at him, at the same time demanding "How much money he had?" Mr. Burns immediately ran off, on which the villian fired upon him, and the ball entering the lower part of his back, passed through the abdomon, inflicting fatal injury to the intestines in its course. The unfortunate gentleman, not thetoday girls was immediately procured, but unfortunately all attention was unavailing and he expired on sanday evening about eight o'clock.—The man by whom this cold-blooded atrocity was committed was described by the deceased as being about 5 feet 9 inches in height. He appears to have remained on the spot for a considerable time after the murder, and to have been accompanied by another individual.

Coroner's Inquest.—John Haye's Esq. coroner for the hundred of West Deby, held an inquest on the remains of the unfortunate gentleman, on Tuesday last, at the Low-hill Coffee-House. The inty having viewed the body, the first witness called was Mrs. Turton, who resides about a quarter of a mile from the synt where the assistend to open it immediately. The individual that knocked then stated his name to be Burns, and said he was shot. He tottered into the House and appeared much exhausted. The statement he gave of the outrage was to the effect given above. He was removed home in a carriage, and at eight o'clock on Sunday evening breathed his last. He was in his 29th year, of most amiable character, and has left a widow and an infant child to deplore his loss. The coroner summed up the evidence, and the jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against two persons unknown. The overseers of West Derby have since offered a reward of 100 guiness for their apprehension, and it is to be justly hoped they will not long clude the vigilance of justice. The remains of Mr. Burns was interred yesterday at the Necropolis, Everton, in presence of a numerous circle of his late friends. His tragical fate has excited, as may be imagined, a considerable sensation in town.
