TAVERN BILL.

[This bill having before being under discussion, we omit the lengthy debate that ensued on Mr Simends proposing that the minimum of the penalty to be imposed on tavern keepers or retailers setling liquer on the Sabbath day, [except to travellers] should be 1.5.—The Members generally having expressed their sentiments; on the baneful effects on tippling on Sundays, and after considerable discussion on the question, the clause in favor of travellers was erased from the bill, and the maximum fixe at 51, and the minimum at 20s.
