

DUBLIN, April 20.—Easter term commenced this day; but up to the moment at which I write (two o'clock) nothing has occurred regarding the prosecution in the case of the King v. O'Connell and others. The Court of King's Bench is much crowded. Mr. Redmond, Mr. Barrett, two more of the traversers, were in Court.

The Lord Lieutenant has yielded to a portion of the request of the Galway magistrates, by sanctioning the appointment of 400 additional constables; but it is understood that his Excellency is opposed to the introduction of the Insurrection Act into that country, until all other means of restoring tranquility have failed.

From information just communicated to me, from a very authentic source, I am of opinion that the Crown will not press for more than a nominal sentence upon Mr. O'Connell and the other traversers. An affidavit is to be placed upon the file this morning, by their solicitor, preparatory to an application for delay, on the ground that the traversers entertained an opinion (which now turns out fallacious) that they were entitled to a writ of error, to be argued and decided before sentence could come into operation, and that in consequence one of them, Mr. O'Connell, left the country, and another, Mr. Steele, went down to Clare. It is very probable that the Court will accede to the application.

All I could learn respecting the separate prosecution against Mr. Barrett, editor of the *Pilot*, for an alleged seditious libel, was, that no indictment against him has yet been sent up to the grand jury.

## SCOTLAND.

EMIGRATION.—We have again to announce the sailing of a number of vessels from Greenock with passengers for America—the *Rebecca*, on Sabbath morning, with fifty eight, and the *Canada*, with seventy-four, for Quebec and Montreal. The passengers by these vessels are principally of that class of our population who have amassed a little money. The *Francis* is the third vessel from Greenock, with passengers for New York this season. Total passengers sailed from Greenock for New York in the first three vessels this season, 254; ditto, last year, 378; decrease this season, 133. The tide of emigration seems to have set in pretty briskly for Canada this season. The vessels that have as yet sailed from Greenock have had a greater number of applicants for passages than they could accommodate a vast number of emigrants both for New York and Canada, have been forced to go to Liverpool and Belfast.—*Glasgow Chronicle*.

## ENGLAND.

EMIGRATION.—Three hundred and sixty persons, principally labourers and mechanics, among whom were many entire families, sailed from Bridgewater last week, in two vessels, the *Friends* and the *Euphrosyne*, as emigrants for Canada. Nearly 100 of the above were sent out, it is stated, at the expense of the Marquis of Bath.—*Bath Chronicle*.

The Paris of Westbury-under-the-Plam, is about to send 240 peupers to Canada, at the expense of £1600.

The French are very actively engaged in building a number of Steam frigates; including those that are on the stocks, they have already thirty; some of them are 161 feet in length, which is within ten feet of the length of the *Victory*. They are to be armed with Paixhan's guns of 12 inch bore, carrying a hollow shot; some of them have four wheels and four engines of 60 horse power each.

Extract of a letter from on board the *Sophie*, arrived off Dover from Batavia:—"We touched at St. Helena, and whilst there, the French frigate *l'Oise* arrived from Bourbon, with troops, and sailed on the 11th of February for France. The captain obtained permission to lead his veterans to the tomb of their immortal chief. They behaved with that decorum which became such fine old soldiers, and showed their sense of the liberality of his Excellency Governor Dallas.

There is said to be, at this time, one individual at Manchester, who, by means of a peculiar process connected with the manufactures of that place, is clearing a weekly profit of £10,000.
