SCOTLAND.

EMIGRATION.—We have again to announce the sailing of a number of vessels from Greenock with passengers for America—the Rebecca, on Sabbath morning, with fifty eight, and the Canada, with seventy-four, for Quebec and Montreal The passengers by these vessels are principally of that class of our population who have amassed a little money. The Francis is the third vessel from Greenock, with passengers for New York this season. Total passengers sailed from Greenock for New York in the first three vessels this season, 254; ditto, last year, 378; decrease this season, 133. The tide of emigration seems to have set in pretty briskly for Canada this season. The vessels that have as yet sailed from Greenock have had a greater number of applicants for passages than they could accommodate a vast number of emigrants both for New York and Canada, have been forced to go to Liverpool and Belfast. — Glusgow Chronicle.
