

A bill for excluding Charles X, and his descendants for ever from the soil of France, and to compel them to sell the property they now hold in that country, within a year has passed the Chamber of Deputies by a large majority.

The German Diet has decided that the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg belongs to the sovereignty of the King of Holland, and has decreed the immediate formation of 30,000 troops of the Confederation, composed of the Contingents of Hanover, Electoral Hesse, and Oldenburgh Nassau, besides a corps of 12,000 Prussians, to give effect to this decree.

It is stated in the Calcutta papers of the 19th Nov that the Rajar of Ruxar, and another person of local influence, had presented to the Governor-General an address of thanks for the suppression of duties. The address bore the signatures of all the zemindars, merchants, &c. of the districts.

The spirit of the age has, it appears, reached even to the peaceful realms of the Emperor of China. At the date of the last dispatches it was reported at Canton, that the Nahomedans in the territory of Ele had again rebelled (the late rebel's son and wife's brother having risen to revenge his death), and that the convicts who were banished to Ele from Canton Province, have been brought back till further information is obtained. A million of thels had been demanded from the Canton Treasury, to be sent forthwith to the seat of war. Another Rebellion has also broken out in Shen-se Province.

IRELAND.

DUBLIN, APRIL 4.—Mr. O'Connell has written a letter, addressed to the people of the Queen's County, calling upon them to return Sir Henry Parnell without a contest, and free of expence.—He uses powerful arguments to show that all questions should now be merged in the great quest on of Reform. I think I may declare that public opinion will sustain Mr. O'Connell in his view of this subject; and that should the Ministry deem it necessary to resort to a dissolution of Parliament, they will find a triumphant return of reformers from Ireland, accompanied by perfect popular tranquility. The letter of Mr. O'Connell will appear in the Pilot of this evening, a large number of which is to be forwarded to Queen's County. Sir R. Ferguson has been returned for Derry.

ENGLAND.

We understand that our Government could prepare for sea, in the course of 24 hours, one of the finest fleets that ever left the harbours of Great Britain. The naval preparations that are going forward are, probably, of a precautionary nature only, but it is said that a British fleet will certainly put to sea shortly, and that Sir Thomas Hardy will take the command.

Extracts from an Act to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province. Passed 31st March, 1831.

The sum of 200l. for the great road from Dorchester to chediac. 275l. for the great road from the bend to chediac. 700l. for the great road from chediac to Richibucto, and the repairs of the bridge over chediac river. 1100l. for the great road from Richibucto to chatham. 1050l. for the great road from Newcastle, to Restigouche. 800l. on the great road from Fredericton to Newcastle; half of which sum to be expended from Fredericton to the residence of John J. Donald, Esq. on said road. 100l. for the road from Richard currie's to the high land upon Indian Point. 40l. for the road from the county line to the Newcastle road; one half thereof to be expended between Stephen Thorn's and the said road. 25l. for the road leading from Newcastle road to that between Grand and Misquapit lakes. 20l. for the road from Yeaman's mill to the Newcastle road. 25l. for the road from the

Newcastle road to hardwood ridge. 25l. for the road from Raphael Porrier's, at the Grand Dig, to Casey's at the cocagne cape. 10l. for the road leading from the main road to Barton's cove on the north side of chediac river. 30l. to erect bridges over Burk's and Mill creek, and improve the road from Burk's to the cocagne bar. 35l. for the road from Thompson's to M'Laughlan's road, on the south side of cocagne river. 25l. for the road leading up the south side of the main bouctouche river. 8l. to open and improve a road from the mouth of Chockpish to the new line of road from bouctouche to Richibucto. 35l. towards building a bridge over child's creek, on the south side of Richibucto river, in addition to the grant of 1828. 60l. for the road on the north side of the Richibucto river. 35l. towards the completion of the bridge over Daigie's creek, so called. 30l. for the roads and bridges on the north and south side of the Kichibougac river. 25l. for the road from Kichibougac to Kichibougac. 15l. for the road leading from the great road up the south side of Kichibougac river. 30l. from the shire town of Bathurst, to the Papineau river. 20l. from the great road to the Tettagouche settlement. 20l. from Teague's brook to Bass river. 20l. from Teague's brook to Pokeshaw. 20l. from Richard Dawson's to the Mill settlement. 10l. to improve the road down the bank at Pokeshaw. 10l. for improving passages down the capes. 15l. from M'Donnell's cove to the Tettagouche river. 40l. for erecting a bridge over the north-west branch of Carraquet river in aid of subscription. 80l. from Pokeshaw to the intended bridge over the north-west branch of Carraquet river, through the Grand Aunce settlement. 15l. from the north-west branch of Carraquet river to the ferry on the southwest branch. 80l. for the portage between Pokemouche and Carraquet, according to the exploration of James Blackhall. 80l. from Dalhousie to Robert Ferguson's mill stream. 20l. from the lower part of Carraquet settlement towards Shippegan. 20l. for a bridge over the river Wough, to be erected where the Carraquet portage strikes the said river. 20l. from the bridge to be erected on the river Wough to Joseph Sewell's. 50l. to explore and open a road from Pokemouche to Tracad. 40l. to finish the bridge over Benjamin river. 20l. to erect a bridge over Nash's brook. 50l. for a bridge over Louisbourg river, near Archibald M'Nair's.
