

Marshall, the late member, has subscribed £5,000, and is ready to double that sum if required.

Incendiarism still continues in Norfolk. The premises of Dr. Bulwer, of Heydon, were fired again on the night of the 17th, and a new cart lodge and bullock shed, and various implements of husbandry destroyed.

The pipe of an engine was cut while playing on the premises. On the following Tuesday another fire occurred at Mr J. Buck's, of Rudham Grange, by which his buildings sustained a damage of £1,000, and his corn implements £500.

Last Saturday night, Lady Parkyns' summer house, a pleasant rural retreat, near Raddington, was fired by some incendiary, who has hitherto eluded justice.

A meeting of delegates from the various Metropolitan Trade Societies, was held last night at the Mitre Tavern, Aldgate, to arrange the proceedings necessary to be adopted on the day that their Majesties will dine with the corporation of London. It was stated that the Societies were to be attended by bands of music, banners, escutcheons, &c. A sufficient number of each society was to be sworn in as special constables, and were to act under the City Authorities if required. 500 sailors dressed in their naval uniforms, blue jacket and white trousers, will attend the festival.

The brig Sir Charles Ogle, Clark, owned by Messrs. Starr, of this town, from Demerara, 19 days, struck on a ledge of rocks near Prospect, on Friday night last during a thick fog. Her masts immediately went by the board, and she soon after bilged—the crew were all saved—of her cargo which consisted of 104 puns, Rum, and 52 of Molasses, little, it is feared will be preserved.

Capt. Rowe, and the Crew of the brig Ruby, from Poole for St. Andrews, have arrived at Liverpool, N. S. The Ruby on the night of the 23d April, struck on the N. E. bar of Sable Island, soon after floated off—her stern post however had been started, and she made so much water that it was found necessary to abandon her.—The Captain and Crew were taken out of her by the Harmony, Godfrey, of Liverpool.

QUEBEC, May 20.—The vessel reported by thy Ceres on St. Paul's Island, is the Hero, of Irvine, wrecked there on the 9th inst. The crew have been brought up to Quebec by the C. Belle, from London.

The Superior of Britol, in proceeding out of port yesterday afternoon, from her birth at Gringam's wharf, in tow of the British America, broke her hawser nearly opposite to the buoy. Another was promptly sent on board from the Steamboat, that before it could be rendered of any service, she touched on a shoal above St.

Helens and snapped her second warp. Having passed over these small rocks, the anchor was let go, but in swinging round on it, she struck a large rock on which she now remains fixed apparently in midships. Since the period of the accident up to this forenoon, labourers have constantly been engaged in discharging a portion of her cargo into the barge Deligent. It is proper to add that no serious damage is supposed to be sustained by the Superior, and that she has not taken in water since the period of the accident.—Montreal Gaz.

A Correspondent under the signature of X, who states he subscribed liberally towards the Building erected in Chatham for a Parish School House, under the impression that a Master was to be obtained from Britain last fall, wishes to be informed, as no such person has yet arrived, if any thing has been done in the business by the Committee, as he thinks 'it full time the public were made acquainted with the cause of the delay.'
