

UNITED STATES.

By Proclamation of the Mayor of New-York, a quarantine has been established at that place, for all vessels arriving from places in the Mediterranean in which it is necessary, to cross the 15th degree of east longitude from London; and all vessels from any port in the Baltic, including the ports of Denmark. A model exhibiting the principles on which the United States Mail may be conveyed without exposure to the depredations of Robbers, and at the rate of 60 miles per hour, is offered for inspection by the inventor, a James Spicer, in Philadelphia.

Briggs was then out, the number of passengers on board, and the probability of not reaching his destination very soon, he could not furnish her with the required provisions, but previous to parting company saw her supplied by the Mountaineer, Capt. Jackson, from Miramichi, bound to London. Capt. Briggs' passengers speak highly of his kindness and attention toward them.
