AGRICULTURE.

TO PREVENT MILE BECOMING SOUR. To prevent milk from turning sour and curdling as it is so apt to do in the heat of summer, the milk men of Paris add a small quantity of sub-carbonate of potash or soda, which saturating the acetic acid as it forms, prevents the coagulation or separation of curds, and some of them practice this with so much success as to gain the reputation of selling milk that never turns.

CURB FOR OXEN STRAINED BY OVER DRAWING .-About half a purt of common soap, stirred up with a quart of milk, poured down the throat of the animal, will, we are told, speedily effect a cure.

CANADA THISTLE.—We caution our good farmers against treating this noxious weed with neglect. Attention to it during the months of July and August, will prevent their spreading at least, and will do much towards eradicating their spreading at least, and will do much towards eradicating them where the ground is not under tillage. We have noticed several instances where they have sprung up in the highway, which have proved of serious consequence to the highways being considered every body's property, and nor under the immediate superintendance of any one, only as regards the roads, they have in such cases been allowed to spread themselves into the neighbouring fields, to the great annoyance of the occupant, when a little time spent in cuttherefore, let every farmer make it his rule to see all the Canada thistles in his neighbourhood cut at least three times in each season, whether they are in his field or in the highway. You would not hesitate to shoot a wolf on your neighbours premises, then do not hesitate to cut a thistle, for be assured that thisties do more injury to agriculture than panthers, wolves and wild cats together.

Preservation of Cabbages.—The London Monthly Magazine gives the following method by which the Portuguese preserve Cabbages on board their ships. The cabbage is cut so as to leave about two inches or more of the s'em attached to it; after which the pith is scooped out to about the depth of an inch, care being taken not to wound or bruise the rind by this operation. The cabbages then are suspended by means of a cord, tied round that portion of the stem next the cabbage, and fastened at regular intervals to a rope across the decks. That portion of the stem from which the pith is taken, being uppermost, is regularly filled with water during very long voyages. The same method might be advantavery long voyages. Composition for preserving Farmer's Utensils .- With three fourths of a pound of rosin in an iron kettle, melt three gal-lons train oil, and three or four rolls of brimstone; when they are melted and become thin, add as much Spanish brown or any other colour you choose, ground up with oil in the usual way, as will give the color you desire. Then lay on a thin coat with a brush, and when dry lay on another. This will preserve harrows, ploughs, carts, &c. many years from the effects of the weather.

Hoven Cattle.—The following is a remedy for cattle that have been hoven by eating damp clover. Mix a double charging of gunpowder in a pint of new milk, and give it to the enimal with a horn or bottle. In nine cases out of ten, this will disperse the fixed air contained in the stomach.

The older they are the finer they become. This cheese has the advantage of never engendering worms and of being preserved fresh for many years, provided it is kept in a dry place, and in well closed vessels:

SUBSTITUTE FOR MALT .- The mechanics' Magazine [London] announces the roots known by the name of Mangel-wurtzel, as a cheap substitute for Malt in the preparation of Beer. The manner in which they should be used is this; cleanse well the roots, cut them into slices, and put them into a boiler In which as much water will be placed as will suffice to cover them, lay a weight on them to press them down,—let them be taken out and pressed,—the liquor so extracted from the roots is to be, with the water in which the roots were boiled, again set over the fire and reduced, by boiling, to such strength as suits the palate,-then add so much Hops as may be considered necessery, let the extricated matter be again set on the fire for one hour, - when taken up, let the liquor be cooled as quickly as possible, and a sufficient quantity of yeast to work, it is generally done with ale. The expense does not exceed 7. English shillings for 16 gallons. The refuse left from the press is an excellent focd for pigs.
