The Courier arrived with the Mail on Saturday night.

The papers by the mail furnish no late intelligence from Europe, we have in consequence, devoted a larger space than usual to our Colonial head. The remarks from the Quebec papers upon the anticipated reduction of the duty, upon the Baltic Timber, and the consequences likely to result to the Colonies therefrom, and the Petition of the Chamber of Commerce, at St. Andrews, upon the same subject, we have no doubt will be read with interest. The Quebec Mercury contains some very clever and correct remarks upon this subject, which we intend publishing in our next number.

At the request of the Magistrates, and a number of respectable Inhabitants, the Sheriff convened a meeting yesterday, at Mr. Hamill's Hotel, Newcastle, for the purpose of Petitioning the Imperial Parliament, to continue the present protecting duty on the Baltic Timber. We have not as yet learnt the measures adopted, or the resolutions entered into at the meeting, but are in hopes we will be able to lay them before our readers next week.
