

There has been an increase during the past year, up to September—of more than 80,300 tons in our shipping, and of nearly \$40,000,000 in the aggregate of our imports and exports. Nor is there less reason to felicitate ourselves on the position of our political than on our commercial concerns.

The President takes a rapid view of our relations with France, Great Britain, Spain, Portugal, Denmark, Naples, Russia, the Sublime Porte, Mexico, Central America, Brazil, Buenos Ayres, Chili, Peru, Java, &c. The President refrains from making any communication on the subject of our affairs with Buenos Ayres, in the present stage of our negotiations with the government.

The national finances are in a highly prosperous state; it is expected, however, that there will be a considerable falling off in the revenue next year, in consequence of the reduction of duties. It is believed the whole of the public debt will be extinguished in 1833. The President is sufficiently anti-tariff for all reasonable purposes. He recommends that the whole scheme of duties be reduced to the revenue standard, as soon as a just regard to the faith of the Government and to the preservation of the large capital invested in establishments of domestic industry will permit. His remarks upon this point are truly sensible and orthodox. His allusion to the position of South Carolina, it will be seen, is brief; but his remarks discover moderation and firmness upon this important subject.

The President seems to doubt whether the public deposits are safe in the U. States Bank! and he recommends the subject to Congress as worthy of their serious investigation! He adds:—'An inquiry into the transactions of the institution, embracing the branches as well as the principal Banks, seems called for by the credit which is given throughout the country to many serious charges impeaching its character, and which, if true, may justly excite the apprehension that it is no longer a safe depository of the money of the people.'

The public lands occupy a considerable space in the Message. An allusion is also made to the North Eastern Boundary question which remains unsettled.

The President repeats his conviction that the constitution does not warrant the application of the funds of the General Government to objects of Internal Improvement. His remarks upon this subject will be read with a lively interest.

Our relations with the Indians, the Cherokees and Georgia, the Army and Navy, the Militia, the Post Office and other Departments, the mode of choosing President and Vice President, the Judiciary system, and some other subjects, are treated of in the Message.
