

favour of a nation which has cruelly insulted me, but which I, notwithstanding, still love and esteem. I had even conceived a grand idea to reconcile all this and to place on solid foundation the peace of the world; but the armed interference in the month of August last in the states of the King of the Netherlands which you arranged and approved has changed every thing. I speak, my lord, without animosity. I love and esteem your nation, but I cannot allow you the right to claim and to violate at once the stipulation of the same treaties as it suits your convenience. The French government has a sacred obligation to fulfil towards my father-in-law, the King of Prussia, it had obtained from that sovereign a promise to refrain from assisting by arms his brother-in-law, the King of the Netherlands, but on the express condition that France should refrain from interfering. You know that so many ties unite the King of Prussia and King William I myself, notwithstanding my attachment to my sister, the Princess of Orange, have sacrificed all my feelings to the desire to consolidate the general peace. The French government, notwithstanding, took advantage of the embarrassment which the Polish revolution caused me, to proceed to this intervention, yet the right as well of Holland as of Belgium to break the armistice had been recognised; the intervention of the conference of London was to be wholly amicable, even according to the positive wish of the French Government. You cannot, therefore, allege any excuse that I can allow of to justify this armed intervention, and henceforth I shall consult only the interest of my empire in regulating the affairs in Poland, without permitting the slightest intervention of this question.

The Austrian ambassador to Switzerland has assured the Helvetic Diet, that the Austrian troops in the Tyrol have been assembled only for the purpose of ensuring the cantons' existence remaining in statu quo.

It was stated in the city this morning that an express had been received from Paris, bringing the papers of Monday and the Messenger des Chambres dated yesterday. They contain nothing of importance. A telegraphic dispatch had been received from Bayonne late on Monday afternoon, bring news from Oporto as late as the morning of the 25th. Don Pedro had been strongly fortifying the city to meet the promised attack of the Miguelites on the 24th; but they had not made their appearance. Admiral Sartorius had sailed to blockade the port of Lisbon, and watch the movements of the Miguelites squadron in case it should venture out to sea again. He had been reinforced by three armed vessels well manned. The best spirit existed among the troops.

TURKEY.—Every account received from the theatre of war in the East appears more disastrous for the Porte than the last. The Pacha of Egypt goes on his way from triumph to triumph, and it seems probable that all Syria will ere long be in his power.

The Pacha of Egypt is almost lord of Syria. He says Mahomed gave Greece to the Greeks, Servia to the Servians, Wallachia and Moldavia to Russia; and therefore then should he deny to me the Province of Syria, which would not compel the children of the faith to emigration, as was the case with his gifts to the Christians?

Joseph Bonaparte arrived in town from Liverpool, on Saturday, by a Liverpool coach. His appearance is very homely, something after the manner of an English farmer or grazier.

A conference of the Ministers of the five powers was held between four and five yesterday afternoon at the Foreign office. It was attended by the Russian Ambassador, the Prussian and French Ministers, the Austrian Minister (the Baron de Wesseburg) on a special mission, the Austrian Charge d' Affaires, and Viscount Palmerston.

Town is literally emptied of its contents. Since the session of Parliament closed, you scarcely meet any body in your walks but men who may be said to live in the streets.

In a letter from Brussels, we find that Leopold has been very near made a second time a widower. The Queen's horse took fright as her Majesty rode out to day [Monday], near Lachen, and ran away with her. Leopold through fear of doing more harm than good, did not pursue her very quickly, and it remained for a poor waggoner to save her Majesty's life, by drawing

his vehicle across the road, as the furious horse approached.

The Marquis of Palmella, who has been in London for a short time on a special mission from Don Pedro, had a long conference yesterday afternoon with Viscount Palmerston at the Foreign Office, which continued till late in the evening. His Excellency afterwards took his leave, and departs to day for Oporto, in company with Senhor Barbosa, with important dispatches from the British Government to Don Pedro.

A melancholy occurrence lately took place at Venani. A tradesman, being suddenly called out of his room on business, left upon the table a Bill of Exchange he had just received. Whilst his wife was engaged in bathing her infant, another child, a few years older, took the bill and tore it to pieces. The father, entering at the moment, became so enraged that he gave the child a violent blow on the head, and it fell lifeless to the ground. The mother dropped her infant into the bathing-tub, and ran towards her elder child, but her assistance was of no avail. In her despair she forgot her younger child for a few minutes, and on returning to the tub found her infant drowned. — French paper.
