This day accounts came in, through au-thertic sources, that four individuals had perished for want of food. Hitherto children, and the aged, and nofirm, have chiefly suffered. It is, however, not the young, the beggar, or the infirm alone, who feel the pressure of want, but the industrious and healthy, and they keep up longer, but how long many will be able to support their present suffering, remains to be seen. to support their present supering, real and to de secon. I act as Clerk and Sexton, [residing near the Church-yard, &c.], and I apprehend the call for a grave from every individual that I see approaching. The calls on private charity are too estensive to be complied with. My house from summer to sumeet is beset with applecants, whom [quite doing violence to my freelings] I am now obliged to dismiss unaided; such of them as I could relieve I have, but I apprehend the same sufficiency for myself if an opportunity does in t offer for St. Chris-topher shortly, and there is no theldwood of it during the hurricane season. The cause of the suffering is the severe drougt we have experienced, the high price of provisions at Sf. Bart's, the want of credit there, and there being generally no surplus of provisions from year to year, as at Barbados. The three most industrious planters are obliged to purchase provisions at St. Bart's which is an unusual thing. A meeting of the Council was hold to-day, and they have petitioned the governoe of St. Christopher to present their petition to Government to grant relief; these Representative in the Assembly also is requested 'a use his endeavors to give there nonnediate aid, but it is ' hegging from the beggar,' for the St. Christopher community, I believe lare very much embarrassed.
