The Lord Bishop, with his accustomed zeal in the cause of charity, has exerted himself greatly; and his exertions have been warmly seconded by his Honor the President, the merchants, and many other individuals. By yesterday noon the sum of one thousand dollars was collected with which the Rev. Mr. Cummins, ever active in doing good, has proceeded with entire approbation of the Bishop, this day to Antigua, for the purpose of purchasing provisions at that island, there being rather a scarcity here of such articles as are most wanted at Anguilla. Mr. Cummins was their former Rector; and he, who was for some time their beloved spiritual Pastor, will be welcomed with feelings which we would not pretend to describe, as now the instrument of relief to their temporal wants. May God send him safely and quickly on the delightful errand!

Letters from Anguilla.

"We have not had coffee, candles, starch (arrow-root) and many other necessaries for a long time, but expect a reinforcement of money to-morrow. Should I be disappointed I do not know I shall make out, for I am now crediting bread and can get nothing else, except meat on Saturdays, for there is not a pint of grain or a potatoe to be obtained in the Island; indeed the people are on the brink of starvation. There has been such drought, so much as to produce a salt crop which it is expected will be collected next month, if there be any persons alive to reap it.—June 29

"I come now to the state of things amongst us. I never saw before the present time distress so great, so extensive and so apparently irremediable as exists in this place at present, and is likely to continue for some long time. Poverty pervades the whole country, and the extreme of it, actual starvation, has carried many a poor sufferer, after a scene of suffering, to a premature grave. This day accounts came in, through authentic sources, that four individuals had perished for want of food. Hitherto children, and the aged, and infirm, have chiefly suffered. It is, however, not the young, the beggar, or the infirm alone, who feel the pressure of want, but the industrious and healthy, and they keep up longer, but how long many will be able to support their present suffering, remains to be seen. I act as Clerk and Sexton, [residing near the Church-yard, &c.] and I apprehend the call for a grave from every individual that I see approaching. The calls on private charity are too extensive to be complied with. My house from sunrise to sunset is beset with applicants, whom [quite doing violence to my feelings] I am now obliged to dismiss unaided; such of them as I could relieve I have, but I apprehend the same suffering for myself if an opportunity does not offer for St. Christopher shortly, and there is no likelihood of it during the hurricane season. The cause of the suffering is the severe drought we have experienced, the high price of provisions at St. Bart's, the want of credit there, and there being generally no surplus of provisions from year to year, as at Barbados. The three most industrious planters are obliged to purchase provisions at St. Bart's which is an unusual thing. A meeting of the Council was held to-day, and they have petitioned the governor of St. Christopher to present their petition to Government to grant relief; their Representative in the Assembly also is requested to use his endeavors to give them immediate aid, but it is 'begging from the beggar,' for the St. Christopher community, I believe are very much embarrassed.—For some time an emigration from this place to St. Thomas and St. Croix, has been going on; yet those who remain suffer—indeed the suffering is extreme."

P. S.—This letter I concluded last night. This morning application is made for two more graves.

Forenoon—One of the grave diggers dropped down from hunger. A child has been found dead in the woods, where it strayed to pick berries.—August 7.

It is rather an extraordinary coincidence that the birth days of the King, Queen, and Duchess of Kent, should occur within eight days of each other. His Majesty completed his 67th year on the 21st August last—the Queen her 40th year on the 13th, and the Duchess of Kent her 46th year on the 17th.

There is now living in Coventry in England, a man named Cohen, 104 years old, and his wife three years younger, both in full possession of their faculties, both mental and corporeal.

The tickets of absent holders will be drawn as their names are called, according as the tickets were purchased.
