Extract of a Letter from the Bend of Petticoe, dated September 22.

The Mulgrave Castle, Capt. John Conners, from New York, bound to this place, came too at Dorchester Island with the cholera on board, and was ordered to the Quarantine ground, where one man died. Since which time, the vessel having gone through the proper cleansing and fumigations, was by the Health Officers allowed to proceed to the place of destination; she arrived this morning at the Bend, and a more healthy looking captain and ship's crew have not come to this port for a number of years. The Captain brought up his vessel without a Pilot, and safely moored her; she is consigned to Mr John Harne, merchant at the Bend, which gentleman expects other two vessels this season to load. If vessels were encouraged to come to this quarter to load, where there is an abundance of fine timber, it would be the making of this fine flourishing settlement, and I am convinced that the day is not far distant when this will be ranked as the first place for business in this country.

ST JOHN OBSERVER.—“The Rain, it raineth every day.”—Out of the last eight days, we believe we have had but one, or two at most, free from rain, accompanied during a part of the time by our old Bay of Fundy acquaintance, the fog,—this morning the rain is descending in torrents, with high winds from the N. E. We much fear that those early and long continued rains will cause serious injury to the crops, particularly in low lands. Wheat, oats, corn, potatoes, and other produce of the field, are yet exposed to the weather in many parts of the country.

COMET.—The Courier states that the long expected Comet was seen from this City a little before daylight on Sunday morning, the 23d inst. in the North West quarter of the heavens, that it appeared quite brilliant, and had a tail or nucleus appended.—The cloudy state of our atmosphere for the last week has completely obscured not only the Comet, but even, alas! the Sun, Moon, and Stars.

ST. JOHN COURIER—York County Election—The poll finally closed at Fredericton on Wednesday last, when the numbers stood for Mr Connell, 651, Mr Taylor 645; Mr Hart, 182; Mr Smith, 1.—Mr Connell was therefore declared to be elected. A scrutiny was, however, demanded by Mr Taylor, which was proceeding in before the Sheriff on Thursday, but as the writ was returnable yesterday, it would be impossible to go effectually into the business in so short a time, and it will in all probability have to be determined by the House of Assembly. We have been informed that persons high in office at Head Quarters, are suspected of having made use of undue influence during the contest; we refrain, however, from giving the particulars of so serious a charge, as it will no doubt be made a subject of enquiry when the scrutiny is brought before the Legislature.

HALIFAX ROYAL GAZETTE.—We believe it is his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's intention to embark, with his amiable family, on board of the Govt. Brig Chabucto to-morrow afternoon. An Address from the Inhabitants of Halifax, to His Excellency is in course of signature, and is to be presented at 11 o'clock to-morrow.

RACES—Our Annual Races took place on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday last. The extreme fineness of the weather drew together a great number of spectators, who appeared highly gratified. The Course exhibited much improvement from last year, both in the number and characters of the horses. The races were well contested.

CANADIAN COURANT.—In our last we stated that Lieutenant Colonel McIntosh, and Capt. Temple, had been again arrested for the affair of the 21st of May, by a warrant issued by Mr Roy, one of the Magistrates of the city. On Monday this affair came before the Judges in Chambers by a writ of Habeas Corpus when both the gentlemen were liberated from arrest. The Judges in delivering their decision, spoke in strong terms of disapprobation of the conduct of the magistrate who issued the warrant. Such proceedings appear to us to resemble vindictiveness and persecution, more than a love of a fair administration of justice, and if persisted in, will tend to shew the public that those who are loudest in calling for purity in the judicature and executive of the country, manifest by their conduct, a despotic and arbitrary conduct totally at variance with genuine liberty.

LOWER CANADA.—While we have the satisfaction announcing the almost total disappearance of the disease from among us, it is a subject of regret to notice in the *Ami du peuple* that it had reappeared at St. John's and St. Athanase, where several deaths had taken place this week; and that it had manifested itself at Mascouche last week, where it is supposed 100 deaths have occurred. The quarantine regulations which for some time were observed at Three Rivers, were withdrawn last Tuesday. In Montreal, the number of interments of persons suffering from this disease for the week ending last evening were six, of whom one was Protestant and five Catholics. Four of them were brought from the sheds or the Steamboats, and two only from private practice. The hospital returns of Quebec exhibit no new cases of cholera during the last three days. Some few cases still occur in private practice, but none now assume the malignant character of cholera spasmodica, of this we are assured by a medical man of eminence. Under these circumstances regulations which before deserved the epithet of salutary must now be deemed vexations, and should at once be modified by granting clean bills of health to ships leaving our port.

UPPER CANADA.—It affords us much satisfaction in our Upper Canada files to notice the very cheering accounts they contain of rapid disappearance or abatement of the late epidemic.

The total number of deaths by cholera throughout the Province of Lower Canada, in three months, out of a population of about half a million, exceeds the total deaths in Great Britain, with a population of fifteen millions, in six months.
