

management it is said from 15 to 20 parishes in the neighbourhood, so that it will be called the Upperward Jubilee. The 'people' are, agreeably to printed arrangements, to assemble on the race ground, and to walk in regular procession to Lanark, passing on their way the village of New Lanark, and after going their round, and through the most public streets, to stop in the bowling green and dine! Upwards of 1200 tickets have been purchased—each person to have one bottle of porter, and a pie, 3d each. All the friends to reform are sanguine that the attendance will be numerous. One person has had an order for 130 dozens porter. Music, flags, sashes, medals, &c. are in great requisition; and it is expected, if the day happen to be fair, that it will be at least a gratifying sight. What most interest all parties, whig, tory, or radical, the crops here in general look remarkably well. A gentleman from this the other week had a tour through the West Lothians, part of Mid Lothian, Stirlingshire, Dumbar-tonshire, and Argyllshire, and is convinced that no where did they seem to be in better condition or farther advanced, than in our own neighbourhood, excepting, perhaps, the holms close upon the Clyde near to Hamilton.

PEACEFULNESS OF WAR—All the great empires of Europe have now attained to maturity, and have arrived within arm's length of each other, so that every people, valuing freedom and independence, must not only be hardened to war, inured to the contemplation of battle, and prepared to face without dismay, the fleets and armies of numerous enemies, but their very character for valour and resolution, as well as for firmness in calamities: and perseverance under difficulties, must stand so high as to inspire hostile nations with respect, and force them, for their own security, to refrain from acts of insult or aggression. But a people who would stand thus in the world's estimation, must not be satisfied with merely cultivating the arts of peace; they must also cultivate or understand the arts of war, and be constantly prepared for action. Such a people would have relieved Varna, and saved Turkey: would have dispensed with the French rhodomontade expedition into Belgium, and instead of supplying Russia with the funds necessary for the invasion of Poland, their comrades alone backed by the virtuous indignation of mankind, would have arrested the progress of the Muscovite hordes without the firing of a single shot. Nations on the other hand, who at every thought or sound of war, shrink back with dismay upon their treasures, and trembling strive to repress, instead of honouring and elevating martial qualities, but have a short lease of feverish independence, and must soon submit to the sway of a more warlike and energetic, though perhaps less cultivated adversaries. This was the fate of all the great empires of antiquity, and will probably be ours, unless we take warning by their fall and suffer—*United Service Journal*.

THE IRISH GENTRY AND THE IRISH POOR.—The classes of society in Ireland are ill-arranged. There is a wide hiatus between the gentry and labouring class; for the class of small farmers, which constitute the tenantry of the country, cannot be ranked much above those who labour for their daily sustenance. The class of farmers in England and Scotland, which forms the pride and the strength of Britain, is unknown in Ireland. Until such a class is created by some means, there is little hope of the improvement in agriculture of that country. As society is there, at present constituted, the nobility and gentry can live in apparent splendour, while their tenantry, the farmers as they are called, eke out an existence more pitiable than the class who labour for hire. A bond of sympathy is wanting betwixt them, and until the connecting link is supplied, a reciprocal desire, of mutual support, arising from an assimilation of interests, cannot be expected to exist among so widely separated classes of community.—*Quar. Jour. of Agriculture*.

The plan of a grand national column suggested to be erected in the metropolis, by public subscription, in commemoration of passing the reform bill, and presented to the Court of Common Council by Mr Death, has, we understand, been submitted to and approved of by the Lord Mayor.

The Society of Friends have presented the Anti-Slavery Society with a donation of one thousand pounds from "a subscription raised to aid in promoting the total abolition of the slave trade and slavery."

HUMAN LABOUR v. MACHINERY.—We defy any machine to equal the delicacy of the human touch in preparing the more exquisite articles of female attire. From this arises the elasticity and beauty of the Indian muslin and Holland damask. It is not generally known that the hemp grown in Suffolk may be manufactured into a web that far surpasses Irish Linen, and rivals, in snowy and satiny texture, the finest Holland cloth; but since the Lancaster machine owners have deluged the markets with miles of cot on cloth, produced by a few weavers, who are immediately turned out to starve (all the glut is over, and then set to work again for a few days, the spinning-wheel of the Suffolk cottage matron has stopped, and the art of producing her delicate Holland thread is actually lost. Is it for the poor, a good thing that Linen can be bought for their use at five pence per yard; but that is no reason that the rich should not encourage a manufacture nearly wholly produced by women, the material of which grows on English earth, and may be made to rival Holland Linen.—*Lady's Magazine*.

It is currently reported in the Ministerial circles, that before the assembling of the new Parliament Earl Grey will have retired from the fatigues of office. His Lordship's bad health is assigned as the cause.
