

government and glory, under the name of Napoleon 11; and of "juste milieu" who wished to crush the spirit of insubordination, of which the growth has been encouraged by the factious press; and by the turbulent and in a great measure unprincipled opposition, that would sacrifice the peace and welfare of their country for the mere advantage of place and power for some months. There is another interest accused of fomenting disorders occasionally and for the base purposes of profiting by them in their speculations on the Stock Exchange. To their advances to the conspirators is attributed the large sums that were found on their persons during the searches of the Police.—Perhaps this charge is unfounded. It is to be hoped so, for the honor of the Paris Exchange; but the charge is spoken of too openly to pass unnoticed; and it is well known that rumours of the conspiracy were circulated from the beginning of the week. This is settling time on Change.

Had success attended the plot of the conspirators, which was discovered the night before last, it is impossible to say what might have been the consequence to France and to Europe. They contemplated nothing less than a change in the Government and dynasty, though what was to be substituted in their stead seems never to have entered into the heads of the leaders of this audacious enterprise. The only object aimed at was the subversion of the existing order of things; for as the conspirators consisted of Carlists and Republicans no congeniality of sentiment on the subject of the institutions by which their country was hereafter to be governed could be anticipated, and it does not, therefore, appear to have been discussed. This affords no bad type of the frenzy of political hatred here.

More than 1500 persons are known to have been implicated in this business. Two hundred and fifty only have been apprehended; among them are a M. Poncelet, a M. Delavaux, and the President of the Societe des Amis Peuple.

Public confidence is much shaken by these events nor can it be otherwise. It is much to be regretted that the Ministry have made themselves somewhat unpopular by their attack upon the press; for otherwise, their system of policy has warded off much evil that might have befallen this country. Whether they will be so successful in their efforts to do so in future, is very problematical to me. They are beset by enemies at home and abroad—powerful, restless, intriguing and bold—and it will, require more than a usual share of firmness, ability and discretion, to extricate France from the dangers of the situation in which she is placed.

**GREECE**—The accounts received by the English Government from Greece, it is said, give a deplorable statement of the bloodshed and disorders which there prevail, and the utter inutilty of expecting any settlement, other than through the agency of a Government so strongly protected from without, as to be enabled to put down the adverse factions, whose interest is eternal disorder.

**EGYPT**—Malta Gazettes to the 20th of December, had been received in London, they state that the troops of the Pacha of Egypt took Juffa on the 8th Nov. and proceeded next day to Caiffa. Another large army was to leave Cairo about the middle of October.—The Governor of Malta had exonerated the Chief Justice and other law authorities from their official duties, as they are now engaged in arranging the new code of laws for the Island.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A French paper states that great discontent prevails in Finland, and that the Russian government are in possession of some important secret correspondence.

The Polish corps of General Rybinski, to the number of 12,000 men, are proceeding to France 900, mostly officers, have arrived at Strasburgh.

Letters from Corsu of the 19th January state that great activity prevails in the maritime movements of the English forces in the Mediterranean, and they are concentrating their forces, caused by the existing differences between the Porte and the Pacha of Egypt. The French fleet will follow the same example.

The Dutch navy consists of seventy men of war, viz. two of 48 guns; six of 74; one of 64; three of 60; fourteen of 44; six of 32; thirteen of 28; four of 20;

nine of 18; three of 14; one of 12; and three of 8 guns

The active maritime force is directed to be increased. The Belgian government had intimated a desire to establish commercial relations with the United States, and to establish there a Minister resident.

It is now generally supposed, that the definite sentiments of the Russian Government, on the convention proposed by the Conference, will not be received in this country until after a personal interview between the Emperor of Russia and the King of Prussia, the journey of the former to Berlin having this object principally in view.

Mr. Hogg is a constant guest at the hospitable table of Mr. Murray, of Albemarle-street.

One day last week, in the village of Welsh Hampton, near Ellesmere, a man engaged to eat for a trifling wager, eighteen penny loaves in thirty-six minutes; and, to the great surprise of every person present, he devoured them in twenty-eight minutes, and drank two quarts of beer.

**INDIA**—Capt. Sever of the ship Alert, from Canton whence she sailed on the 23d Nov. states that the difficulties which had arisen between the British and Chinese, were adjusted in consequence of the former having submitted to the pretensions of the Chinese and that a vessel had been sent to Calcutta with this intelligence to prevent the sailing of a British fleet from thence for Canton, which it was believed was ordered to sail thither, on the first news of the difficulties reaching British India.
