UNITED STATES.

THE DELUGE OF THE OHIO.—We received last evening, a letter from a friend in Cincinnati, from which the following is an extract.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 15, 1832.

My dear Sir—Our city is deluged. The Ohio is higher than it has been within the memory of man, and is at this time rising faster than at any time yesterday. It is a grand and awful spectacle. The water in Second Street is from three to four feet deep.—Boats of every description, except steamboats, are floating over all the lower part of the city. Rafts too are hastily put together to rescue families and goods. More than a thousand persons have been compelled already to quit their homes and fly to the high grounds. Small houses are drifted off in numbers. All the bridges in the vicinity are either covered or gone. The basement rooms of all the large warehouses and stores are floated. All is tumult, hurry, excitement, distress. Thank heaven, no lives have been lost. The water has risen gradually for several days, about an inch an hour is now the ratio. It must be at this moment near seventy feet about low water mark. The current is fearfully rapid. An observation yesterday made it near seven miles an hour. A boat which came down yesterday reports a rise of five feet yet to come.—We hear that all the villages above and below, on the river banks, are washed away; the inhabitants have escaped to the hills and erected temporary shelters.

What must become of New Orleans when the accumulated waters of all the immense rivers of the West pour down together upon her? It is fearful to think of it. The hope is that all have not swelled like the Ohio. And yet I see not why. The same intense cold sealed them up at the same time; the same sudden thaw opened them again; and for aught I know, the same continued rain for several days, may have forced them equally beyond their wonted bounds.

This is certain—Cincinnati is more favorably situated than any town between Pittsburgh and New Orleans. The water cannot rise to third street. Yet even here the dangers to property is immense. What then must it be elsewhere?

The most prompt measures have been taken by our citizens in furnishing shelter for the refugees; The court house, the churches, and private dwellings, wherever there is room, that will cover them until the waters subside. But whether they will find their small tenements when they return to seek them, is a dubious question. Some certainly will not.

Both fuel and provisions are scarce and uncommonly dear. Access to the city from every quarter is cut off, in a great measure, by the swelling of all the streams. Our only consolation is, that the distress cannot last long. The sources of the flood are not inexhaustible. The torrents are too rapid to flow many days.

Mean time, I have seen so sad countenances. The universal expression is that of amazement;—Men forget their own petty grievances in the universal sublimity of the scene, I have surveyed it from an eminence which commanded the whole view. I can only say that it is a miniature of *The Deluge*.—Boston Courier.

EARTHQUAKE IN PERU.—The Editor of the Baltimore Gazette is indebted to the politeness of a friend for the following extract of a letter dated

Lima, Nov. 19, 1831.—In my last I forgot to mention that a dreadful earthquake took place at Arica on the evening of the 9th, at 9 o'clock, which nearly reduced all the houses to a state of ruin. In Tacma the walls of nearly all the houses are cracked, and one fell in: The distance between Arica and Tacma is about 14 leagues. A place called Locembo about 12 leagues to the north of Arica, is said to have been levelled to the ground. The shock was also felt at Islay and Arequipa—but was not felt here.

He emigrated from London a few years back, and has since exercised the trade of a Cabinet Maker, in which he was equalled by few and excelled by none in this country.
