

France may be benefitted by its permanent possession, but rather from the certainty of the advantages which must thereby accrue to the place itself. No member of the civilized community of Europe can wish, except from party motives, that Algiers should be rather left to fall into its former state of barbarism than that the French should maintain any footing there. A great deal might be said to prove that the preponderance of France, as a maritime power, cannot be advanced a single step by the possession of Algiers.

BRUSSELS, TUESDAY EVENING, July 24.

The cholera morbus continues to extend its ravages in this city and in Antwerp. Persons who left the latter city this morning, assure me that it has attacked the citadel, and that 3 of the 11 Dutch gun-boats have been obliged to hoist the yellow flag, and to move to some distance from the remaining number. This malady will tend more to cause the Dutch Government to give up that fortress than an attack of the Belgian forces.

The 68th protocol has arrived in Brussels, but nothing is known of its purport.

The Dutch naval force is represented here to be much less than stated in the official papers. It is said to be effective in only three ships of war, the Zeeuw, the Waterloo, and the Kortenaar, the rest of the 12 being mere hulks, or new ships unfinished: 10 frigates several of which require repairs; 15 corvettes, some of which are yet on the stocks, and some old; 15 brigs, 2 barges, and two steam-boats, form the whole of the force, of which so much has been said.

The French Government is said to have threatened, in case of an attack on the part of Belgium, to withdraw their officers from this army. This threat is embarrassing to the party of the movement, who long for war.

The Venice Gazette of the 12th instant mentions, on the authority of some private letters, that an expedition against Morocco is fitting out at Naples.

The Courier de la Moselle states, that the Grand Duke of Baden and the King of Bavaria are not likely to ratify the adhesion of their plenipotentiaries to the resolutions of the Frankfurt Diet.

The Nuremberg Correspondent of the 10th inst. has intelligence from Vienna to July 14, stating that the health of the Duke of Reichstadt continues to improve which is chiefly ascribed to the use of nurse's milk. The same paper also contains the following from Posen, dated July 10:—"The Minister of the Interior at Berlin has been invited by the Cabinet of St. Petersburg to have all passports delivered to Prussian subjects, who wish to go to Poland, signed by the Russian embassy at Berlin. We learn upon good authority that the recruiting in Russia meets with many difficulties. This accounts for the incorporation of Polish soldiers with Russian regiments, a measure which the Government would not have had recourse to without some urgent motives. Russia cannot bring 400,000 men into the field."

WAR.—The news from Brussels and Holland looks warlike. The Dutch King has replied to the last note of the conference with apparent sincerity, but with a studied ambiguity, the object of which is delay. England and France have been duped too long to submit to such an imposition; and as there is reason now for suspecting the sincerity of the other powers, we may expect that the matter will be brought to a certain issue. An English fleet, it is said, will soon blockade the Scheldt; and the Standard asserts that a French gun-boat had drafted, from Bragan and other places, all the pilots who were acquainted with the entrance into the same place. In the meantime Leopold is prepared to commence hostilities. The citadel at Antwerp anticipates an attack; and the movement of troops indicates an intention of coming instantly to blows. Events may delay the marriage of his Majesty of Belgium; but by the latest accounts, it was understood that he was to set out on his matrimonial excursion for France, on the 2d of August, to be married on the 7th, and leave upon his return on the 9th, when he was to be met by the best compliments and heartiest good wishes of his attached subjects.

In Paris the people are intent upon celebrating the anniversary of the three days, and discussing the policy of an immediate attack on the depots, who have de-

nounced liberty. It appears that the ferocious Government at Warsaw is still unsatisfied, and that fresh orders have been issued for using greater diligence in the prosecution of victims. A functionary, named Rozzeski, who, to his shame, would seem to be a Pole, and who calls himself President of the Department of Justice at Warsaw, has issued a circular to the advocates in the Kingdom of Poland, accusing many of them of neglect, in not bringing forward prisoners who are charged with crimes, and in opposing obstacles to the regular course of justice. He, therefore, threatens, that should they still be contumacious, every advocate after being three times summoned, will be suspended from office during three months; and being summoned four times, will be punished by entire loss of office. What a thirst for blood!

HOUSE OF COMMONS, MONDAY, July 23.

The next resolution was a sum of £27,438 13s. 1d for the charges of the ecclesiastical establishment in the British North American provinces.

Mr. Hume objected to the vote, as the people of Canada were adverse to it.

Lord Howick said that as the clergy, who were now paid by the government, died or were otherwise provided for the people of Canada would be called on to support their successors.

Mr. Hume.—What! Bishop and all?

Lord Howick.—Yes! Bishop and all.

Mr. Inglis said that wherever the flag of England waved, there the church of England was the established religion—Mr. Dixon denied this, and Mr. Shiell said that the catholic was the established religion in Lower Canada, on the authority of an act of parliament.
