

to a certainty follow the rejection of the measure. The wholesale houses in London have sensibly felt the effect of this change during the past week, many of them having sold more fancy goods within a few days than they had previously done from the commencement of the season for the spring trade. This demand is however only for the consumption of the aristocratic classes and those approaching to that rank, and bears but a small proportion to the means of supply from the manufacturing districts. There, the great mass of the people, cannot command the means of enjoying the benefit of their own production, and then it would puzzle the most ingenious tormentor to devise means to render their condition worse. Considerable uneasiness is felt at the appearance of the Cholera at Leeds, it being apprehended that it will at last spread in that densely peopled district, and still further interrupt and depress trade.—*Mark-lane Express.*

QUEBEC GAZETTE.—AGRICULTURAL REPORT FOR MAY, 1832.—District of Quebec. [These Reports have been discontinued since October.] The winter did not set in till the middle of November, and there was no severe frost before the first week in December. A small quantity of snow which fell in the beginning of November remained on the ground, but there was no heavy fall before Christmas. Afterwards the snow fell at intervals in large quantities, and particularly towards the spring. In April it was four or five feet deep in the woods, at a time that usually the greatest part of it is melted. The winter, as indeed the whole of the past year, was remarkable for a succession of mild and severe weather, with one or two thaws with heavy rain. On the 21st April and 3rd May there were two heavy falls of snow, and it was not till the warm days of the 10th, 11th, and 12th of the present month, when the thermometer rose to 65°, 75°, or 80°, that the fields began to be clear of snow. On the 17th there was thunder in the south; and since the 13th the wind has continued easterly, with heavy rains. On the 19th and 21st the thermometer was generally down from 40° to 50°, and the weather cloudy.

Wheat sowing commenced about the 12th of the month, and became general the week after, but was retarded by the wetness of the ground in many places. Before the 20th, the usual period when it is conceived to be too late, about half of the seed was in the ground. The first sown is just coming up, after double the usual time. The farmers have gone on sowing wheat and oats on the ground prepared last fall, which was rather to a greater extent than usual; but Spring ploughing has been put off for this more pressing work.

Few potatoes are yet planted, and the ground has received no preparation. In the new settlements, where many are planted on land chopped during the winter, no opportunity has been had of burning preparatory to clearing for planting.

The grass was partly preserved from the frost by the sprinkling of snow in November, and came out green from under the snow; but the prevalence of the cold weather has checked it, although there has been no frost since the snow went off. The scarcity of fodder made it the only resource, in many places, to save the cattle from starvation, they were turned out before the snow was gone, and many of them have perished in addition to those who died before. It has been observed that last year's hay had not the usual nourishment in it; and disease has been very general among sheep and horned cattle, but particularly the former; of sheep it is supposed nearly a half have perished in this district, and of horned cattle probably an eighth.

Vegetation is now more backward than in the Spring of 1816, and the same is the case all north of New York. The forest trees are fully a fortnight later than usual, in this part of the country. The orchards and garden fruit trees and shrubs have suffered materially. The flower buds of the best sorts of apple trees are killed, and the leaf buds make no progress; the wood of the tender branches is drying, and the whole trees will probably perish, or be long in recovering.

A more unpromising opening of our short period of production has been seldom witnessed; greater losses in cattle and by floods have rarely occurred; but there is no ground for despair; all may yet be remedied by labour, economy, and care and the bountiful dispensations of a kind Providence in the latter part of the season.

HALIFAX JOURNAL.—JAMAICA.—We have Kingston Papers by the Argo, to the 3rd May. That Island was quiet. The House of Assembly had agreed to the report of a Committee appointed to inquire into the names of Slaves, whose conduct during the late Rebellion may have entitled them to consideration, and reward from the Country, which Report recommends manumission to several, and rewards, by annuity, &c. to all, the

slaves who distinguished themselves in checking the revolt, and preserving lives and property during its existence.

His Excellency had given his assent to a Bill to enable the Commissioners of Public Accounts to raise a loan to discharge the debts contracted by the late rebellion. The House of Assembly had voted the sum of 150 guineas to Commodore Farquhar for the purchase of a sword, in testimony of the approbation which the House entertained of the conduct of that gallant officer during the rebellion.

Delegates have been appointed to proceed to the Mother Country to state the embarrassments, and represent the grievances of the Colony to His Majesty and the British Government.

Twenty-five years ago, this fine Colony produced from 130,000 to 150,000 casks of sugar annually, in the last seven years its average produce has not amounted to 100,000 casks; and the recent events will probably reduce that number considerably. Number of Slaves in 1827, 213,730.

Mr. Joshua Rowe has been appointed Chief Justice of Jamaica, on which occasion he has received the honor of knighthood.
