FLOOD ON THE HUDSON.—From the Albany papers of the 14th inst., we learn that the Hudson river was open, and clear of ice as far as could be seen northward. The ice began to move, in a mass, on Monday the 12th and did not break up until next morning, when the water rose about 15 feet, and so high as to flow quite across South Market-st., as far north as Hudson-st. The flood of water is said to exceed that of the great flood of 1818, owing solely to the swollen state of the river. The water continued to rise until noon of the 13th, and reached nearly to Market-st. in the middle part of the city, and in fact overflowed it at Hamilton-st. at the lower market, and at Lydius and Ferry-streets, as well as the passage below and the new wharves. The access to the Eagle Tavern, National and Columbian hotels, and Exchange Coffee house, could only be by boats or carriages. The principal damage was done in the forenoon, when the ice setting in at the head of the pier, came down with irresistible force in the direction of the stores and piles of lumber. The three-story buildings situated at the termination of Columbia-st. bridge, were crushed in a few moments, and the bridge destroyed; that at the foot of State-st. is also greatly damaged. The lower part of the pier was not injured. This structure is a great protection to Quay-st. and in this instance seemed to turn the current and check the progress of the ice, which otherwise would have ruined an immense amount of property.

The water in the northern part overflowed the canal, and rose as high as the garden of the Paroon. The tow path bridges are thrown over and crushed.

The other damage, as given in the Advertiser, is as follows:—Ten buildings on the Pier, owned by Wm James, much injured; Peter Moakley, Smith and E. C. Devan, are also sufferers by injury to these buildings; Gough & Herring, and Messrs. Slack, lost much by staves and lumber; every thing on the Pier above the Columbia-st. bridge swept away; Bartlett & Bent's Furnace near the South ferry almost entirely carried away; S. S. Fowler's extensive leather and morocco establishment seriously damaged; the house on Van Besselaers's Island, directly opposite this city, much visited as a place of recreation in summer, carried away; the house and barn of Mr Wilbur at the ferry dock, Greenbush, entirely destroyed on Monday night, with all its furniture; a large raft lying between Albany and Troy, valued at about \$5000, totally scattered and lost; the bridge over Norman's Kill, on the Bethlehem turn-pike, impassable by carriages; M'Cormick's bridge entirely carried away; many families, on the Dock, in this city, were obliged to leave their dwellings in a very abrupt manner, and some of the inmates were taken out in boats from their second stories.

FROM THE NEW YORK ALBION.

We have received from Mr Bankhead his Majesty's Charge des Affaires at Washington, a highly important document on the Cholera Morbus, which will be found in another part of this paper. This document emanates from the Central Board of Health, at Whitehall, London, and is to be regarded as an official promulgation of the British Government, by whom it was transmitted to Mr Bankhead. * We make the following deductions:—

1. It appears, then, according to the best information and the most careful and dispassionate examination of all the evidence that can be procured, that the period of gestation or incubation of Cholera Morbus does not exceed five or six days. That is to say, that the poison will not be dormant in the system, after infection, longer than that period. Consequently the crew and passengers of a vessel making the very shortest passage of 15 or 20 days only from Europe, would be perfectly harmless, provided no disease had occurred during the voyage.

2. It also appears that the power of one individual to infect another after his own recovery, does not continue longer than five or six days if we except the case of his Majesty's ship *Topaze* at the Isle of France.

3. It is well established that flax and other merchandise do not possess the power of conveying infection in any very essential degree; and that a few days of airing and purifying are amply sufficient to dissipate all germs of the fatal malady.

4. That after making the most ample allowance, (by way of making assurance doubly sure,) the maximum of necessary sanitary restriction in the 1st case is 10

days; in 2nd, (including the consideration of the solitary instance of the *Topaze*) 20 days; and in the 3d, 15 days.

5. That this view of the question is highly gratifying and consoling to the inhabitants of this hemisphere, as having reference to their personal safety and happiness; exceedingly favourable to commerce, as tending to lessen the severity of sanitary restrictions on vessels, crews and passengers,—and highly salutary in diminishing the alarm which must necessarily arise in this country, should the disorder unfortunately extend to Liverpool, Havre, &c.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, March 6.—Resolved, To the Commissioners of Government House, the sum of £543 1s. 11d. being for expenditures thereon, and on the out-buildings, in the year 1831.—To his Excellency the Lieut. Governor, a sum not exceeding £750 to be paid over to a commissioner for procuring furniture for Government House, and for repairs; no more than £200 of said sum to be applied to such repairs.—To his Excellency the Lieut. Governor, the sum of 100l. for the improvement in the navigation between Fredericton and the Great Falls, in the construction of Towing Paths.

MARCH 7.—Resolved that there be granted to his Excellency the Lieut. Governor, the sum of 200l. for the purpose of procuring furniture for Government House.—To his Excellency the Lieut. Governor the sum of 400l. to pay the Inspecting Field Officers for the present year.

A Message from his Majesty's Council.—Mr Bliss, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the council had agreed to the several resolutions of Appropriation dated 16th, 18th, 24th, 27th, and 29th February, and 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, and 6th March, 1832, with the following exceptions, viz:

To Charles Brown the sum of 80l. 17s. 10d. being part of a penalty recovered from him and paid into the Province Treasury for the use of the province.

To His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, the sum of 200l. to provide for the services of Stephen Humbert, as a Tide Waiter at the city of Saint John for the year 1831.

To Robert Doak, late a Supervisor of the great road from Fredericton to Newcastle, the sum of 70l. 8s. in full of any claims he may have against the province for over-expenditure.

To the Assistant clerk of the Legislative Council, the sum of 25l. for his services the present session.

And that he was further directed to communicate the following resolution:

Resolved, that although this House hath, under the particular circumstances of the several cases, concurred in the resolutions sent from the Assembly the present Session, for appropriating moneys for female teachers of Schools, such concurrence is nevertheless not to be drawn into precedent for the future.
