QUEBEC GAZETTE.—We understand that Monseigneur the Coadjuteur of Quebec is not to be called to the Legislative Council. His Excellency the Governor in Chief expressed a desire to call the Catholic Bishop of Quebec to the Executive Council, and the advanced age of Monseigneur Panet not permitting his attendance, Monseigneur the Coadjuteur Bishop of Fussala is to be called to the Executive Council in his stead.

A call to the House of Assembly has been ordered for the 10th January. Mr Bourdages gave notice that on that day he would move some Resolutions on the Constitution of the Legislative Council.

FISH. The quantity of Dry Fish imported, is falling short every year, owing to the Legislatures of Nova-Scotia and New-Branswick having granted a Bounty on this article, which diverts a great portion of the fish, cured at Bay de Chaleur and Gaspe, from coming to this market. A bill conferring a similar benefit, we are happy to see is before the Assembly of this Province. The import of Salmon the past season was unusually great. This description of fish, and also pickled Herrings, would command much higher prices in this market, with an increased consumption, were they subjected by law to a strict inspection, as is the case in Nova-Scotia. We have not been able to ascertain the quantity of Mackerel imported, but believe it to have been one half less than in the two preceding years.

HALIFAX JOURNAL.—We notice with much pleasure the employment of the poor, upon the principle of last winter, (the breaking of Stones) and from which so many advantages are known to have resulted, is now in full operation. During the past week about 160 persons were at work.

When it is known that nearly 1500 persons have received medical assistance from the institution, free of charge, we feel confident, it will ensure for it a continuance of that Public and Legislative support to which it is so justly entitled. The highest praise is due to the Gentlemen who daily devote their time and attention to its management.

UNITED STATES.

NEW ORLEANS.—Exports for the year ending the 30th September, were as follows:—We give below the principal articles, small articles would considerably swell the amount: 424,639 bales of cotton; 54,430 hhds. tobacco; 16,039 bbls. molasses; 28,547 hogsheads and 2,742 barrels sugar. The flour from the upper country is stated at 360,580 barrels. Arrivals of ships, brigs and schooners, 1,405; steam boats 815.

NEW-YORK.—It is painful to receive, as we now do, from all quarters, so many accounts of disasters which have befallen our merchant vessels during the late violent gales and severe weather.

The army, as at present constituted, comprises 346 commissioned officers, and 5642 non-commissioned officers and privates. Total 6,188. These are distributed among 43 stations, along the coast and on the fron-

tiers, being an average of 144 to each. The number of recruits enlisted during the year is 1511. The number of desertions during the year was 1,063; besides 183 from the places of rendezvous, before joining companies. The estimated loss in money by these desertions is 118,321 dollars; which, if divided equally among the non-commissioned officers and privates, would give to each an additional compensation of 21 dollars per annum.

SCHEDIASMA.

MIRAMICHI:

TUESDAY MORNING, JANUARY 17, 1832.

The Duke of York Packet, after a long and boisterous passage of 65 days, arrived at Halifax on Tuesday last, with the November mail. The latest dates by this conveyance, are to the 5th from Falmouth; but the American papers furnish Liverpool dates to the 9th, and London to the 8th, from which we have made copious extracts.

The London papers announce that the spasmodic Cholera had made its appearance at Sunderland, having been transported by vessels from Hamburg, and four or five deaths had taken place. The papers of a later date state, that the panic had subsided, there being no new cases; and it was doubted whether the disease was the genuine spasmodic cholera.

His Majesty's Privy Council has ordered his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury to draw up a form of Prayer, to be read in the Churches and Chapels throughout the Kingdom, during the continuance of danger from the Cholera.

A subscription has been opened at Halifax, and the papers contain an Appeal to the Inhabitants, in favor of the sufferers by the late destructive hurricanes in the Island of Barbadoes. The following are extracts:

"Several respectable Members of our community, partaking of the universal sympathy with our fellow Colonists at Barbadoes, under the awful visitation which came upon them in the last summer, have been very desirous that we should offer our feeble assistance in alleviating the distress of those sufferers who have been involved in ruin."

"Accidental circumstances have prevented the inhabitants of Nova Scotia upon the present occasion, from being as prompt as they generally are in works of benevolence, but there has been no want of feeling for the severe distress that has been endured, and it is not too late to co-operate in the laudable efforts that have been made in other places for its relief."

A meeting of the inhabitants of St. Andrews, was held on the 6th inst. for the purpose of taking into consideration the utility of establishing a Steam Boat, to ply on the Bays, Out Bays, and Rivers adjacent, for the expeditious and economical conveyance of passengers and Goods, and for the purpose of towing of vessels, rafts, &c. &c. Several resolutions were passed in favor of the measure; a subscription paper, was opened, and 77 shares immediately subscribed, by the gentlemen present. It is the intention of the Shareholders to apply to the Legislature to incorporate the company under the title of "The Steam Boat Company." The capital stock is estimated at £2,500 to be divided into transferable shares of £12 10s. It is expected the Boat will be ready by the 1st July next.

LOWER CANADA.—The Assembly of Lower Canada have voted the sum of £300, to be placed at the disposal of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec, for the purpose of collecting such ancient documents as will tend to develop the early history of the country. In carrying the Legislature into effect, application will be made to the French Government, for access to such despatches and other documents relative to the country and its resources; as were received from their representatives in this country, prior to its conquest by the British.

SPORTING INTELLIGENCE.—Mr. Osbaldestone's match to ride 200 miles in ten successive hours, was successfully performed at New Market, on the 5th November. The distance was divided into heats of four miles each, and was performed in seven hours, nineteen minutes, and four seconds, to which must be added one hour, twenty two minutes, and fifty six seconds; occupied in mounting, dismounting, and refreshing,—total—eight hours, and forty two minutes, or one hour and eighteen minutes less than the time stipulated for the performance of the match.

The President of the United States has transmitted to Congress all the information in the possession of the

Executive, relative to the capture, abduction, and imprisonment of the American citizens, by the Provincial Authorities of New-Brunswick; and the measures which in consequence thereof, have been adopted by the Government of the United States.

Extract of a Letter, dated, Grenada, December 4, 1831.

"Half past seven o'clock, P. M. We have just experienced a most severe shock of an earthquake; I suppose it lasted nearly half a minute. The people were assembled in church, and the shock was tremendous. I really think the West-Indies is a devoted country: hurricanes, storms, and earthquakes follow one another in continual succession."

The Hope, Middleton, from Whitehaven, for this port, put into Limerick, with loss of sails, being 20 days out.

The Sir William Wallace, from this port, has arrived at Margate.

The Newcastle, Ridley, from Liverpool to New-Brunswick, put into Kinsale.
