

claim to said territory, and for the cession of the jurisdiction thereof, on the one part, and an ample indemnity therefor, on the other part, and notice thereof being communicated to the Governor, the Governor with the advice of Council, be and he is hereby authorized and requested, to appoint three commissioners on the part and in behalf of this State, to treat with such person or persons so appointed by the President on the subject aforesaid; and any agreement or treaty, to be made in pursuance of this Resolve, is to be submitted to the Legislature of Maine for approval or rejection; and, until such agreement or treaty be so submitted to and approved by the Legislature of Maine, nothing herein contained shall be construed in any way as implying the assent of this State to the line of Boundary recommended by the Arbitet, or to the right of the General Government to adopt or sanction that line instead of the line described in the treaty of 1783.

**THE TARIFF.**—It will be perceived in the brief sketch of the proceedings on Monday last, in the U. States Senate, that that body have rejected [24 to 18] Mr Hayne's amendment to Mr Clay's Resolution, which has occupied the principal attention of the Senate for the last two months, and they have also rejected Mr. Forsyth's motion to refer it to the Committee on Agriculture. The votes are decisive of the sentiments of the Senate on the main question, and in favour of adhering to the protective system. This, we apprehend, will settle the question decidedly, at least for the present session, that the protective system is the fundamental principle of the nation. We apprehend that the sentiment of the House of Representatives is still stronger in favor of the system, and that it will be permanent.—*Boston paper.*

The Philadelphia Inquirer says—Mr Carey will, in a few days, publish a pamphlet on the Tariff Question, being an inquiry whether an amicable arrangement is not practicable between the friends and enemies of the Tariff, and the suggestion of a plain, simple and rational plan of compromise, whereby conciliation may take place, without any material injury to the manufacturing interest, and yet the objections of the nullifiers, who really wish the permanence of the Union, may be obviated."

**GALE AT MANILLA.**—A most destructive gale took place at Manilla on the 13th Nov., by which nearly all the vessels in the harbor were driven on shore; in the vicinity of the city it was computed that 10,000 houses were blown down and that 70,000 men, women and children were houseless. The convents have given 25,000 dollars for the relief of the sufferers."
