To whom is application to be made for the payment of that reward? To Dr. Tennent, to Mr. Grimshaw, or to the Northern Whig. Oh! it is most scandalous, that our judicial affairs should be conducted in a manner so monstrously absurd, and in a manner that must alienate all confidence from the constituted authorities. We have laws;—but—*Northern Whig.*

GLASGOW FREE PRESS. The English Reform Bill now goes rapidly forward in the House of Lords, and is expected to be ready to receive the Royal Assent in about eight or ten days. A large flock of the Anti's have absented themselves during its discussion, and left only the more absurd of their party to keep up a show of resistance, which is more ludicrous than formidable.

Another noble stand has, according to a second edition of the True Sun of Wednesday, been made by the House of Commons, which will tend still more to strengthen the hands of Ministers, and confound and overawe their opponents. *The Commons have refused to grant any further supplies until the Bill be actually passed into law, and Ministers have acquiesced in the resolution!* This is the way to go to work. The King may frown on his patriotic brother the Duke of Sussex, and appoint Tories to offices about his person as much as he pleases; and the German, Wellington, and Cumberland faction may exclusively enjoy his ear and the light of his royal countenance: but Earl Grey and the nation can afford to look on all this with indifference and contempt, now that there is virtue enough in the House of Commons, to make it stand unflinchingly by a public-spirited people and a really honest Minister.

The Scotch Bill has passed the second reading in the Lower House; and as it will occupy little time in Committee, it will soon also be carried up to the Lords, to be there passed with even more expedition than the English one. On the Irish Bill considerable opposition is expected from the Irish Members; but not to such an extent as either seriously to embarrass Ministers, or consume much time.

Every appearance gives reason to believe that Earl Grey, being now certain of carrying all the Reform Bills without creating Peers, will entirely abstain from such a step, and leave it to the House of Lords either to accommodate itself to the altered circumstances in which it must soon be placed, or by a contrary course to bring itself into collision on some vital question with a Reformed House of Commons, and thus render either an abolition of it, or a large infusion of liberal members into its ranks, absolutely indispensable. Perhaps, all circumstances considered, his is the wisest course which the venerable Premier could adopt,—as he thus places the destiny of the House of Peers entirely in its own hands, leaving it time to profit by experience, and regain the respect of the people, by a future cordial co-operation with the people's independent representatives.

If the Reform Bills be carried in a fortnight we may expect a dissolution about a month, and then it will remain for the new electors to do their duty to their country, by electing such men as will pledge themselves to an honest, jealous, and uncompromising promotion of the country's true interests. The new Parliament is likely to be called together early in November. May it redeem the hope the people have conceived of it!

A Committee has been appointed to inquire into the propriety of renewing or withholding the Charter of the Bank of England, and also to report on the present system of English Banking.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

Paris and other parts have arrived since yesterday, but contain no fresh intelligence respecting the

consequences of M. Perier's death: No successor to him has been appointed. The rumour of the Duchess of Berry's having been in France, and still being in the neighbourhood, is revived; and it is said that the Ex-Dauphin (the Duke d'Angouleme) has been seen off the coast of France. A mighty vision! A cod's head and shoulders would be about as awful.

The *Moniteur* contains a Royal Ordonance by which 80,000 men of the class of 1831 are called out, the drawing for them to commence on June 27.

The funeral of M. Perier took place on Saturday last. For half a century, since the death of M. de Vergennes, no Minister has died in office; and the military and civil display, it is said, has not been exceeded since the funeral of Louis XVIII. The king has created the deceased Premier's brother a Peer of France.
