

These riotous proceedings caused His Majesty to issue a Proclamation—the following is the substance: “Whereas in divers parts of Great-Britain, and more particularly in the towns of Derby and Nottingham, and in the city of Bristol, tumultuous assemblages of people have taken place, and outrages of the most violent description have been committed both upon the persons and property of divers of our subjects; and whereas all the restraints of law and order have been overborne and trodden under foot by such lawless multitudes, the mansions of individuals violently entered, pillaged, and set on fire; the ordinary course of justice forcibly interrupted, the goals for the confinement of criminals broken into and destroyed, and malefactors and persons charged with offences, let loose upon the public, to the great disturbance and danger of the common weal, and the subversion of the established Government: And whereas the welfare and happiness of all nations do, under Divine Providence, chiefly depend upon the enforcement of the law:” &c.—His Majesty expresses his determination to suppress such disorders; and accordingly by this proclamation, warns his subjects against every attempt to violate the laws, and calls on all Magistrates to repress any tumults, enjoining on all good citizens to lend their assistance “in enforcing the law against all evil doers, and in protecting their fellow subjects in the enjoyment of their property and the exercise of their rights, against all forcible, illegal, and unconstitutional interference, control, or aggression.

The funds are quoted as steady, at former prices, the best criterion on which a stranger can form an opinion of the actual state of the country.

With the exception of the intelligence of the assassination of the President of Greece, Count Capo d'Istria, there is no news of consequence from the Continent. The Cholera still prevailed extensively at Cronstadt and St. Petersburg, but was abating at Vienna. The latest date from Hamburg (October 25) states, that there had been 42 new cases of cholera within the last twenty-four hours; total deaths, 213.

We copy the following paragraph from a Communication in the last St. John Courier, under the signature of a Friend of Genius:

On Tuesday the 20th, the House in the occupation of Mr. Angus McIntosh, Inn-Keeper, in the Town of Richibucto took fire about seven o'clock in the evening; but although the progress of the devouring element threatened speedy destruction to the premises, great and powerful assistance was so readily and so efficiently rendered, that the fire was completely subdued before essential damage was sustained. On the night of the following Thursday, a house in the same place belonging to Mr. Hugh McKay, and occupied as a house of Entertainment, also took fire; but owing to the ready assistance which was immediately rendered, the flames were speedily subdued.
