"GENTLEMEN,

"Apprehending that the pestilence now prevailing in the Canadas, might be introduced into the Province of New Brunswick, by their contiguity, or by Emigrants direct from those countries where the disease has for some time existed, the Inhabitants of this town desirous of preventing the introduction of the disorder, and in compliance with a request of the Town of Bangor have thought proper to restrict the intercourse with your Province; for which purpose a patrol will be placed on the roads to carry their wishes into effect.

"In order to prevent all possible inconvenience to the Inhabitants of your Province, we would intimate that any person travelling with a certificate from some Health Officer in St. John, Fredericton, or Woodstock, will be allowed to pass, and all others will be stopped.

MIRAMICHI.

TUESDAY MORNING, JULY 24, 1832.

We have no later intelligence from Europe than furnished by the Packet. We have carefully perused our English papers, and have gleaned a variety of interesting European items, and under the Spirit of the British Press, will be found several very clever and severe articles upon the Question of Reform.—Under the Spirit of the Provincial Journals, we have copied some remarks from the Montreal Courant & Gazette, regarding the conduct of Mr. Papineau, the Speaker of the Legislature of Lower Canada, who has of late, by his strong attachment to the democratic party in the Canadas, and the conspicuous part he took in the late melancholy and fatal election riot in Montreal, rendered himself quite notorious. His uncharitable refusal to bestow his mite towards the relief of the distressed orphans and widows in Montreal, who have lost their parents and husbands by the dreadful malady which is now ravaging that city, is another striking illustration to the many already recorded in the annals of every country, of the hollowness of that Patriotism, which courts mob popularity, and proves the truth of Goldsmith's assertion—"that those who have most virtue in their mouths, generally have the least in their bosoms."

The arrival of the Schr. Water Witch, at St. John, from Boston, furnishes dates from that city to the 12th, which records the melancholy intelligence that the Cholera had broken out at New-York, and at Albany, and although reported as less virulent in its effects than in the cities of Montreal or Quebec, was making sad ravages in human life. The following intelligence we copy from a postscript in the last St. John Observer.

CHOLERA IN NEW-YORK.—The number of cases in private houses reported within the 24 hours ending on Sunday the 8th, at 12 o'clock, was 29, deaths 10, new cases, where the patients were conveyed to the hospitals, 13, deaths 11, cured 4. Total of cases 42: deaths 21. Reported on Monday: cases in private houses 18, deaths 4, cured 1, convalescent 8. In the four hospitals

cases 30, deaths 10, cured 6, remaining 31. At the hospital at Bellevue, cases 57, deaths 14, cured 3, remaining 73. Whole number of deaths in the 24 hours ending at 12 o'clock on Monday 28; whole number of new cases 105.

The Journal of Commerce says—the great increase of cases in to-day's report, is from a new source altogether, viz: the Bellevue Alms-house. There are in that establishment more than 2000 persons in all, generally with constitutions broken down: the Cholera has attacked a good many of them, but has not been so fatal as might have been expected. The Medical Council submitted some regulations to day, to be published to the citizens, cautioning them against exposure to night air, cold from the sudden changes of the weather, and excesses of all sorts: they say the cases continue to occur chiefly among the intemperate, the indigent and the imprudent.

The Official Report of Tuesday the 10th, announces 109 new cases and 44 deaths, viz: at dwelling houses, 44, deaths 5; at the hospitals 22, deaths 13; Bellevue 43, deaths 25. Cured at the Hospital and Bellevue 9, remaining cases 124.

So much is the disease confined to particular classes of persons and localities, that many physicians in extensive practice have not seen a case.

The Editor of the New York Courier says—we hear the Cholera is in Philadelphia, but the fact is concealed by the Board of Health. They had better tell the truth.

ALBANY.—In Albany on Saturday evening, the Board of Health reported 10 cases and 3 deaths. On Sunday evening 11 cases and three deaths.

There were two cases at Greenbush, opposite to Albany, on the 6th, landed from vessels in the river. There had been no case on the 7th among the inhabitants of the village.

At Albany, carts have been sent through the streets, sprinkling them with a solution of the Chlorid Lime.

A letter from a gentleman in Boston, to his friend in this city, dated on board the Water Witch, 9 o'clock, Thursday evening last, says:—"I endeavoured to get a paper of this evening, (12th) which contains the news of yesterday (Wednesday) from New York; there had been 130 new cases of Cholera there on that day. One case occurred on board the steam boat President, last night, on her passage from New York to Providence. The boat is sent down to the Quarantine ground, and the passengers not allowed to land; the steamboats have discontinued running from this date. We are all well and in good spirits, and our city free from disease, and when it comes we hope it will lay a light hand upon us, but we mean to stand our ground."

Another Letter from Boston, a few hours later, says:—"The steamboat from New York has just arrived, and reports 200 cases of Cholera in that city, for the 24 hours previous to her leaving. It was supposed that 50,000 people had left New York.—Business at a complete stand.—In Boston, people are greatly alarmed and numbers preparing to leave the place."

It will be seen from the following order issued from the Governor and Council at Halifax, that all vessels arriving at that port from Miramichi must perform quarantine. It is highly commendable at all times to be cautious, but if the Governor and Council of Nova Scotia were aware, as we are, of the little danger to be apprehended from the introduction of disease from this port, they would see the inutility of such a measure.

At a Council held at Government House, on the 15th day of July, 1832.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, &c &c &c. It is declared and ordered, that the Quarantine Regulations established by an order in Council, bearing date the 17th day of April last, are in full force with respect to all vessels arriving at any Port or Place in this Province, from any part of the United States of America, and from Miramichi, in the Province of New-Brunswick.

The Courier left Richibucto with the mail on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, and arrived here about 7 o'clock on the evening of the same day. This brief notice will enable our readers to form some idea of the improvements that are taking place on that line of road, which reflects the highest credit on the management and perseverance of the Overseers.

A Correspondent wishes to call the attention of the Board of Health, and the Commissioners of Roads, to the state of the street leading from the Methodist Chapel to Mr White's Hotel, and the necessity of adopting some measure for draining off the stagnant water that remains on each side." We would recommend to the immediate attention of the former body, a very great public nuisance in the rear of the new building occupied by Messrs. Copp & Carter. All the praiseworthy regulations which they have enforced for the cleansing of the dwellings and premises of the inhabitants, will be of little avail in preserving the health of our town, if

such places are allowed to remain at this season of the year, to pollute the air with their noxious vapours.

Five or six persons still remain in the Lazaretto, on Sheldrake Island, but are all in a convalescent state; they will, in all probability, be discharged in the course of a day or two.

It is with much satisfaction we are enabled to state, from information from various parts of the County; that the crops, generally, look remarkably promising, notwithstanding the unprecedented backwardness of the season.

The Montreal papers by the mail are to the 7th inst., and represent the Cholera as subsiding rapidly in that city. The Quebec papers up to the 6th make similar remarks, but the paper of the 9th, the latest we received, and which we inadvertently mislaid,—states—that they were sorry to have it to record, that the disease had within the last two or three days assumed a more malignant appearance, and has cut off a number of the Inhabitants.

The total number of Emigrants arrived at Quebec, since the opening of the navigation, up to the 23d June, amounted to 30,494. To corresponding period last year, 30,878.

QUEBEC.—The arrivals to yesterday amount to 500, being 27 more than at the corresponding period of last year. The tonnage is in proportion. Vessels outward bound are leaving the port fast, nearly 100 have cleared at the Custom House since the 21st inst. Seamen's wages have advanced in consequence of the late mortality—and £6 per month, the panic having in a great measure subsided, is now demanded.

The Alcyone, from Liverpool, for Miramichi, was run foul of at midnight on the banks, and so much damaged that she became a total wreck. The crew were taken on board of a vessel bound to Halifax, and landed at Arichat. The Powerful brought up one of the seamen, and one was lost overboard.
