

Reports are in circulation, which we believe to be well founded, that the prevailing disease had shown itself, with some malignity among the settlers detained at Grosse Isle; 20 deaths had occurred at the station in 24 hours. Probably the malady came from Quebec.

August 4—The interments of the six days closed yesterday are, we believe 15, 16, 22, 37, 31, 22. Several of the deaths in the last two or three days were the result of attacks several days preceding. A gradual improvement of the public health has taken place.

We have, so far, thanks to an all-wise and beneficent Providence, been exempted from this dreadful scourge, and it behooves us, to use every precautionary measure to prevent its introduction; and as far as human means will avail, no pains or exertions should be wanting to mitigate its ravages, should such a calamity befall us.

A Correspondent sent us this morning the following note; to which we would call the attention of our Board of Health:

SIR,

In the early part of the season, our Board of Health issued some very salutary regulations for the cleansing of our streets and premises. Now, I would ask the Board have these regulations been attended to by the inhabitants; or have they seen them enforced. I answer—no. To prove my assertion, I would request any of the members of our Board to pay a visit to the premises in the more densely inhabited parts of Chatham, where the effluvia arising from numerous pig styes, is most noisome. I would also request them to pay a visit to the Slaughter-house near Mr. Henderson's Wharf, and there judge for themselves, if my assertion is not correct.

I do not wish to find fault with the Board; on the contrary, I think that many of their acts reflect much credit on the body, but I do say, that in the instances above stated, the inhabitants of Chatham have just cause to complain of negligence on their part.

POSTSCRIPT.—We were indebted this morning to Captain McDonald, of the Mariner, which vessel arrived last evening on her second voyage from the Clyde, for Glasgow papers to the 10th July. We have hurriedly gleaned below the principal articles of news which they furnish.

From the Glasgow Courier of July 8.

The state of the relations betwixt the Great European Powers, is daily becoming of more interest, but will probably assume a new and a less doubtful aspect, when the recent events in Spain and Portugal decide the policy to be pursued by the Court of Saint Petersburg. Letters received by the South of France allude to the equipment of a strong squadron at Toulon, which undoubtedly is intended to strengthen the French fleet in the Levant.

The Revenue accounts for the last Quarter are not unfavourable: the increase of the Excise duties for that period is said to amount to £56,000.

On Saturday last our most Gracious Queen embarked at Woolwich, in the Royal George Yacht, for Rotterdam.

London, July 5.—The state of the relations between England and France, on one hand, and Russia on the other, divides the attention of the French papers of Thursday with the affairs of Spain: It seems to be the general opinion on these subjects, that war with Russia is approaching, and that a bankruptcy in Spain is inevitable.

The 77 individuals charged with being concerned in the late Riots at Brussels, were conveyed on Wednesday last to Mons, where they are to be tried.

Letters from Napoli, dated May 22, in the German papers of the 29th ult: state that an English fleet of ten ships of the line, and several smaller vessels were in that harbour, and that an equally powerful French fleet was daily expected: it is supposed that their destination is the Black Sea: The Russian vessels have wholly vanished from the Greek seas:

From the Glasgow Courier of July 10.

Advices have been received from Copenhagen, dated the 28th ult., and by these we learn that the King of Denmark had performed an extensive tour through his dominions, and had experienced much gratification from the proofs of attachment exhibited to-

wards him in all the places he visited. Prince Frederick has wisely been left in Iceland. Great rejoicings have taken place in Sweden, on the anniversary of its Sovereign's birth.

The German papers contain an important article, manifesting the views of the politicians in Austria, regarding Don Miguel. It is evident that, in Vienna, an interest has been excited in his favour. Letters from Northern Italy state that he landed on the coast of Sardina, and immediately proceeded to the Austrian territory, whence it is inferred that he will seek an Asylum in the Imperial dominions.

We have just been favoured, by the kind attention of a mercantile house in town, with the following important extract of a letter received yesterday afternoon from Constantinople. It confirms our apprehensions that the policy of Russia is daily becoming more warlike:—

“England, after her usual manner, prefers a protracted and extensive war at a distance, to acting with energy, and striking the blow at the favourable crisis. Russia, ever true to her purpose, is now advancing on the Persian frontier, and unless opposed by some obstacle much more formidable than any which the present weak, wavering, blind and selfish Cabinet of England can present, will, in all probability, at no very distant period, pour her hordes in British India.”

London, Monday Evening, July 7.

The accounts from Madrid, via Paris, are to the 23d ult.—the elections in that country promise to be three-fourths revolutionary. We fancy that these who have but a small stock of patience, will soon discover that the anticipations entertained by the ex-Bishop of Antun, Prince Talleyrand, and his protegee, Lord Palmerston, as to their treaty having finally settled the affairs of the Peninsula, will prove very unfounded. With respect to Don Carlos, he is here making his kingly arrangements, conferring his peerages with quite as much form and confidence as was the ex-Emperor of Brazil some 18 months since, and is actually at this moment negotiating a loan in the city, so that the opinion of the stability of the final arrangement is far from being universal.

The accounts from Switzerland communicate the important fact, that the demands of the Northern Powers have been complied with. The journals of the King of the Barricades have been boasting for the last month, asserting that the French Government would support the Scrip, and so forth. But when the dictum of the Russian, Prussian, and Austrian Governments was pronounced, the Hero of Genappe treats the Swiss pretty much in the same way as he behaved to the Poles some three years since.

NEW YORK, July 28.—We learn that the Br. ship Henry Grattan, 50 days from Londonderry to Philadelphia, with whiskey, 200 tons of coal, and 180 passengers, went ashore on Long Beach, Little Egg Harbour, on the 19th instant, and a very heavy sea running at the time, the ship bilged shortly after grounding. The Captain succeeded in getting ashore for assistance. The mate cut away her masts to keep the vessel from rolling. On the 20th inst. the wreck-master succeeded in landing all the passengers and crew safe on the beach. The passengers are in great distress: one of the crew was badly hurt by the falling of the masts. The ship and cargo will be totally lost, but the sails and rigging saved, though in a damaged state.
