Riots.—Chatham was the scene of a most disgraceful riot on Sunday afternoon last. Such things ought not to be allowed—the strong arm of the law should interfere and check them. There are several persons, inhabitants of Chatham, from whom we ought to expect better things, always engaged in these riots, who seem constantly on the alert to pick a quarrel with the seamen, when on shore, to the disturbance and alarm of the peaceful inhabitants, and the profanation, too frequently, of the Holy Sabbath. We give these persons warning—if we again find them engaged in such disgraceful scenes, we shall make a public exposure of their names, when, we trust, the proper authorities will take cognizance of the transaction, and severely punish the delinquents.

The Brig Juno, lately arrived at Richibucto, took from a wreck at sea 223 passengers, all of whom were in a dreadful

state of misery. One female, whose husband was lost, was actually delivered in the boat, and the infant was brought into port in a state of perfect nudity, and in a state of filth absolutely indistinguishable. The mother, who is reduced to a condition of apathy, could not be persuaded to cleanse her child, when a charitably disposed lady whose feelings of disgust were overpowered by her benevolence, herself performed the office of nurse. Provisions and water were so short on board the Juno, that all were put on short allowance, and when the vessel arrived in the port, and the passengers obtained water, they drank with such avidity that alarm was entertained at the consequences to be feared from their imprudence. They were so crowded that none enjoyed the comfort of lying down; but all were stowed in a sitting posture, the foremost men between the hindmost legs. The Justices have provided a house and provisions.
