BY-LAWS FOR PILOTS!

let :- That a Pilot shall in all cases behave himself civilly, 1st:—That a Pilot shall in all cases behave himself civilly and be strictly temperate, and sober, in the exercise of hi^s Office, and shall use his utmost care and diligence for the safe conduct of every Ship or Vessel, while under his charge, and shall also be careful she does no damage to others, under a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds. 2nd:—That any Pilot who observes any of the Buoys driven away out of their place, shall forthwith send an account of the same to the Commissioners of Buoys, under a penalty not ex-ceeding Five Pounds.

eeeding Five Pounds.

3rd:-That as the Pilot who first boards a Vessel is entitled by law to the preferance of her pilotage, or if refused by the Master thereof to half pilotage; every Pilot shall board the near-est Vessel when more than one is in sight, under a penal y not exceeding Pilot shall be supported by the point of the pilotage.

4th:-That any Pilot who runs a Ship or Vessel aground while under his charge from negligence or mismanagement, on conviction, to pay a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, or be suspended as a Branch Pi'ot for such time as the Justices may deem proper.

FROM THE ST. ANDREWS'S STANDARD. THE TIMBER TRADE.

Or all the interests which affect the condition of New-Brunswick, the first in importance is that of the Timber Trade. The procuring of masts for the use Timber Trade. The procuring of masts for the use of His Majesty's Navy was the primary pursuit of the Lumberer in this Province, but it was not until after the operation of the Berlin and Milan decrees that its immense resources were duly estimated, and that their results assumed a striking position, both in a commer-cial and political point of view.

It is an extraordinary circumstance that this trade has arisen, and continued through all its fluctuations, without ever having received any countenance from the Legislature of the Province or of the mother country, but on the contrary that it has had to struggle against restrictions and imposts, which were sufficient against restrictions and imposts, which were sufficient to repress, or even annihilate, such pursuits as could not call into their aid equal energy and enterprise. It is much to be regretted that no regulations have ever been made for the proper manufacture of the several kinds of lumber, and the consequence of this neglect has often been felt in depreciated prices for an inferior article. article.

It must be obvious to every one that looks about him, of how much importance it is that the staple of a country should he rendered as perfect as possible in as far as art can be employed. We have numerous examples of the success which attention to a superior state of manufacture has commanded, and at the same time we have instances of extensive revenues being wrested from nave instances of extensive revenues being wrested from particular branches of trade by the rivalry of successful skill. Nations have converted apparently inadequate objects into sources of wealth by directing their ener-gies to bring them to perfection; and the examples of individuals who have struck out new paths to the ac-quisition of riches by improvements in the arts, are numerous and well known.

It is not our purpose at present to enter at any length into this subject, but to raise a warning voice against the conduct of those who send an inferior article from our ports. Look at the Prices Current from which we made extracts a fortnight ago. Saint Andrews White Pine is rated there at three half-pence a foot under that of Saint John, Richtbucto, Miramichi, and Bay Chaleur, and in fact at three pence per foot under the best quality of Miramichi!

It may be said that the export of square timber is small from this county, and deserves no encouragement; the more advantageous trade in sawed lumber requir-ing all the rough materials that can be procured. We ing all the rough materials that can be produced. We have long been of opinion that the licenced quantity of ton timber should have been limited, and the mills encouraged, for besides the greater profit to the country which attends this minute manufacture, there are other which attends this minute manufacture, there are other considerations of great weight. In getting square tumber, immense tops are left in the woods, and fre-quently large pieces are cut from hollow buts, or con-chps trunks, and left to rot, that would afford the first description of boards. The great danger of extensive Errs in the forests is increased by such preceedings and their dreadful effects were too dearly experienced in the awful conflagration of 1825 which extended from the Ponobscot to the Bay des Chaleurs. Bat the en-couragement of the sawing trade should not divert us from attending to the proper manufacture of square timber. Because it is nearly exhausted it should not be neglected and carelessly produced. There would be a dereliction of principle in this, and care should be taken that it is not carried into the more favored divitaken that it is not carried into the more favored divi-sion of the trade. There can be no doubt but it is advisable to extend our Mil's as much as possible, but it is also most imperative on us to endeavour to improve them, and as this line of business is now in very favorthem, and as this line of outstness is now in very lavor-able repute, we should be most anxious to preserve it by every means in our power. 'Of all divisions of this trade,' says Mr Bliss, 'the production and export of Deals is now becoming the most important: and this is the only portion of the business to which any applica-tion of machinery can be rendered available.' Should the present imperfect manufacture of deals be continu-ed, there is reason to fear that the trade will decline, and it shall be our duty from time to time to take up
