PARLIAMENT. - Although the temporary stoppage of the Government has turned aside Mr Ward's motion for reducing the Irish Church establishment, it will not prevent its being again brought forward whenever the business of Parliament permits. It will then be seen how far the government intend to go in their ideas of church reform, and what difference of tone is to be expected from the accession of the retiring members. True policy will always correct abuses; if long unattended to they will turn to putrefaction, and the frame 11 which they are engendered become an easy prey to the batteners upon corruption.
