

lency's despatch of this day, which accompanied two copies of orders, received by your Excellency from the Government of Lisbon, as well as a packet of proclamations, signed by Don Pedro, Duke of Braganza, and, in reply, it is my duty to state that, in order to avoid the shedding of more Portuguese blood, the propositions of which your Excellency has sent me a copy are accepted.

"As it is permitted to Don Miguel to embark in any port, and in any of the vessels of either of the four Allied Powers, he has chosen the port of Sines, or any other in Algrave, and on board an English vessel; and he desires to know whether her most Serene Highness the Infanta Donna Isabel Maria, who is in the fortress Evras, is to accompany him.

"It now remains to make the necessary arrangements, for which purpose I wait the orders of your Excellency, and I am ready to appear in any place which you may point out, if it should be necessary.—God preserve your Excellency.

PARLIAMENT.—Although the temporary stoppage of the Government has turned aside Mr Ward's motion for reducing the Irish Church establishment, it will not prevent its being again brought forward whenever the business of Parliament permits. It will then be seen how far the government intend to go in their ideas of church reform, and what difference of tone is to be expected from the accession of the retiring members. As we have already said, if the ministry attempt to carry any sweeping experiments upon the church, they will find the feelings of the House of Lords arrayed in opposition to them, and that opposition will be fatal. True policy will always correct abuses; if long unattended to they will turn to putrefaction, and the frame in which they are engendered become an easy prey to the batters upon corruption. But while we grant there are abuses in the church establishment, we would not have them removed by any process which would destroy the vitality, and waste away the substance of religion itself. Let pluralities, if it is thought proper, be abandoned, let non-residence be prohibited; let Catholics and Dissenters be prevented from feeling the burden of toleration, and let the revenues of the church be divided, if possible, with arithmetical nicety between this Bishop who has too much, and that Curate who has too little: all that the church requires is, that the plan by which these measures are to be shaped shall not be the will of some factious and irreligious individuals, but the constitutional and fundamental property which was given her for the support of religion shall not be applied for a totally different purpose.

Lord Egremont gave a real old English dinner at Petworthpark, a short time ago, to 3,500 women and children of Petworth, and the surrounding parishes. There were 1,000 stone of beef, and 800 plum puddings. The table reached nearly a mile, and there was supposed to be 10,000 persons of all ranks to witness the joyous fete, most of whom participated in old English sports, provided for their amusement. A grand display of fireworks closed the happy day.

Considerable curiosity has been excited in London by the appearance of a steam carriage gliding along amidst the other vehicles, and accommodating itself to all stoppages and reductions of speed necessary to a thronged thoroughfare. No doubt it required all the skill of the pilot, as it had occasion, in Cornhill and in Poultry, to reduce its speed, stop sometimes suddenly, and make way through very narrow spaces; it cleared every impediment however, without the slightest contact, and running down Cheapside, turned up St. Martin's-le-Grand, and stopped at the New Post Office to take up a passenger, which it had also done in Cheapside. The self-propelled vehicle then ran up Aldersgate street and Goswell road into the city road, at the rate of ten miles an hour.

The Lord Chancellor last week committed to the Fleet Prison the son of a horse dealer, aged 19 years, for eloping with Miss Dean, aged 17, a ward of his lordship's court, having a fortune of £5,000.

Baron Hagel, the Austrian botanist, who lately visited the Neilgherry Hills, in India, declares that the unknown varieties of trees and shrubs, existing there

alone, exceed ten thousand. The wild rose runs up to the tops of the highest trees, and grows to the thickness of four or five inches. A delicious specimen of orange, but not exceeding a filbert in size, is also found there.

The King of Bavaria is desirous of realizing the idea of Charlemagne, viz—the junction of the Danube and the Rhine. The plan of this gigantic enterprise is said to be already drawn up, and will speedily come under discussion.

It is stated by a Trades' Unionist, that 365,000 is the number of the members of Unions in the metropolis and suburbs, and that within 12 hours they can raise for any great object, £1,500 by a penny subscription.

Milton wrote upwards of fifteen thousand English verses, Collins and Gray fifteen hundred each, and Lord Byron upwards of seventy thousand verses.

There are 41 letters in the Russian language, and not less than 214 in the Chinese. The Italian has only 20, and the Latin and Hebrew 22 each. The Sanscrit has 50, the Turkish 33, and the Persian 32.

A new writ has been issued for the county of Fermanagh, in the room of Gen. Archdall, who has vacated by accepting the Stewardship of the Chiltern Hundreds.

The Hon. George Cavendish, the candidate for North Derbyshire, in the room of the Earl of Burlington, is a second lieutenant in the Rifle Brigade, and, if elected will be the youngest member in the house.

In the committee on the Great Western Railway Bill, on Wednesday week, Mr George Stevenson, the civil engineer, said that, by the proposed railway, 10,000 soldiers might be conveyed from London to Bristol in four hours.

There is a suite diamonds at Messrs Rundle and Bridges', Ludgate Hill, the value of which is 70,000 guineas.
