

book for the Emigrant—showing at a glance the distances from Britain to the nearest points, the supplies necessary to bring out, and the arrangements most suitable for obtaining a passage and remitting money to the Colony.

**CLEARING LAND.**—During the last two days, while the wind has been blowing strongly from the westward and every thing around us parched by the drought, it is really surprising to witness the thoughtlessness and presumption of persons in the neighbouring settlements in setting fire to the woods, as well as to collected heaps of brushwood, &c. for the purpose of clearing land. Our village yesterday was enveloped in smoke, and several persons who attempted to return to their homes in Napan, were forced to return in consequence of the fire, which raged with much fury, on both sides of the road. Fears are entertained that many of the settlers will suffer in their crops; as the flames had reached the fences on farms under cultivation.

A law of the Province sets aside certain periods of the years, when settlers shall ignite their piles, &c. we should therefore, like to see it put in force—the country has already suffered too severely from this practice. The best advice we can give to such as have sustained damage, is, to use their endeavours to ascertain the names of such persons as have so wantonly infringed the laws, and enter a prosecution, as we feel convinced there could not be a jury empaneled, that would not readily indemnify them for any loss they may have sustained. Thus, they would not only be doing an act of justice to themselves and family, but conferring a benefit on the community in which they reside.

**HANDSOME TRIBUTE.**—The Hon Daniel Webster, in the course of an eloquent speech in the United States' Senate, described Great-Britain as—

‘A power to which, for purposes of foreign conquest and subjugation, Rome, in the height of her glory, is not to be compared; a power which has dotted over the surface of the whole globe with her possessions and military posts, whose morning drum beat, following the sun, and keeping company with the hours, circles the earth daily with one continuous and unbroken strain of the martial airs of England.’

**THE WEATHER.**—Last week we noticed that the season had been unusually warm. It has so continued during the past week; and as there has been little, or no rain since, the crops begin to suffer from drought.

**BATHURST.**—We received by the mail this morning the following document, with a request that we would publish it. The inhabitants of Bathurst are the first in the Province, who have manifested a desire to express in a public manner, sentiments, which very generally prevail in the British North American Colonies.

*To the High Sheriff of the County of Gloucester.*  
The Undersigned do request you will call a Public Meeting of the Inhabitants, to be held at the Court House in Bathurst, at an early day, for the purpose of adopting an Address to the Hon. E. G. Stanley, on his retirement from Office, expressive of the high feelings of admiration, with which his public measures have been viewed in this Country, and the deep regret experienced on learning that His Majesty's Government has been deprived of a Colonial Minister, the steady and uncompromising character of whose administration, was conducive alike to the security of the subject, and the honor and dignity of the Crown.

**JAMAICA.**—The Jamaica Despatch of the 18th April, furnishes the particulars of two Duels, which took place in that Island on the preceding day.

The first between Mr Myers, Crown Solicitor, and Dr Whittaker—the former receiving his adversary's ball in the left side, which nearly perforated the body, and he had merely time to dictate a few commands to his second, ere death closed his career. The cause of this meeting which terminated in so melancholy a manner, was Dr Whittaker's stating at a Vestry Meeting, that Mr Myers, Solicitor to the Parish, had instituted proceedings against one of the collecting constables, for the recovery of a small sum, and thereby putting the parish to an expense of at least two've times the amount. Mr Myers commenced an explanation—lost his temper, and told Dr W. that his assertions were false! The accounts were subsequently passed, and Dr W.'s insinuation proved totally unfounded. Mr Myers was much respected and his premature end seems to have caused deep regret; he has left a widow and two children. The second duel was between a Mr Lazarus and a Mr Dias. The former received his antagonist's ball below the hip.

**FROM THE ST. JOHN COURIER.  
RECIPROCITY TREATIES.**

We were this morning obligingly favoured with the annexed extract of a Letter to a Mercantile House in this City, dated, Liverpool, 28th May.

A motion will be made on the 5th June, in the Commons House of Parliament, by Mr G. T. Young, that the treaties called *Reciprocity*, may not be renewed with the Northern Powers of Europe; and in order that he may have all the support we can give, a Petition has this day been forwarded to Lord Sandon, our Liverpool member, to be presented by him, a copy of which is sent herewith.

To the Honorable the House of Commons of the United Kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the undersigned Ship Owners of the Port of Liverpool,

Humbly Sheweth—

That your Petitioners are vitally interested in all measures affecting the shipping interest of the country. That the capital employed in shipping has been for a series of years, unproductive, and that the British ship owner has suffered great loss and distress, are facts which have been fully proved by evidence before a Committee of your Honourable House. That from the same source it has been unquestionably proved, that this depression, it is humbly submitted, may be dated from the year 1824, when the Reciprocity Treaties with certain of the Northern Powers, came into operation, which by placing the Foreign ship owner on an equal footing with the British, without reference to the great difference of expense in the relative equipment and navigation of their Vessels, have necessarily induced a competition ruinous to the latter, and against which he is utterly unable to contend. That the British shipping thus of necessity withdrawn from the Baltic trade, having been forced into others already fully supplied, the Rates of Freight have been reduced to the depressed and ruinous state in which they now are. That your Petitioners would humbly, but strongly impress on the consideration of your Honourable House, that while the British Ship Owner is thus impoverished by the effect of treaties, reciprocal only in name, no advantage is derived therefrom, by any other branch of trade, since it is matter of notoriety that the export of British Manufactures to those countries with which we are said to be in reciprocity, has not increased since those treaties came into operation.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honorable House will adopt such measures as may place the British Ship Owner on a fair and equal footing with Foreign Competitors.
