

upon; and the present year will prove whether any good result is to accrue therefrom.—The Rideau Canal, formerly the great outlet for all descriptions of fish, being now completed, requires no supply; and the Lake herrings having abounded in U. Canada last year, materially diminished their supplies from us. The sales of fish generally have been made by auction; and severe losses, to close, have been submitted to.

FLOUR.—Large parcels of Canada fine have changed hands at 25s. 6d. at which price holders are willing to sell more; 25s. has been offered for a quantity and refused. Canada superfine, to the extent of 100 barrels, has been sold at 27s. 6d. for consumption, uninspected, but quality guaranteed. American superfine is held at 27s. & 27s. 6d.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, MAY 14.

A letter from Washington, dated Saturday says:—“Neither Houses of Congress was in session to-day. The French dispatches have excited the ire of the President. It is said, that they attribute to the King the defeat of the Appropriation in the Chambers fulfilling the Treaty with us. The president will make a communication on Monday to Congress on the subject, recommending an immediate action on the part of Congress, and it may have, although it ought not, an influence upon French goods if that affect is only temporary.”

The correspondent of the New-York Commercial writes thus.—“The only thing afloat to-day, and worth writing about, is the apparent rupture with France. It is not real yet—but I cannot answer for it, that it will not be before the year ends. ’Tis said the President has despatches from Paris—that the refusal of the French Chamber of Deputies to grant the indemnity money to carry the treaty with us into effect, was owing to the interference of the King, Louis Philippe, and to the vain boast of Mr Rives, that the sum the French had agreed to pay was twice as much as was due us—and that the President will send a message upon this subject to the Senate on Monday, of no very mild character, unless he shall happen to get cooled down in the mean time, an event more to be hoped, than looked for.”

Cholera at Havana.—We learn from Capt. Gladding of the brig Gov. Hopkins, arrived at this port on Thursday evening, from Havana that the cholera had again commenced its ravages at that place, and was spreading considerably in the city and among the shipping.—The brig Sampson of Providence, had lost two men by this disease, and the ship Moro Castle of New York had lost two. Capt. G. states that it was confined chiefly to the city and he was informed that it had not appeared on the plantations.

A New Orleans paper of the 25th ult. says—“The Henry Clay, which arrived here the night before last, brought lamentable tidings from the steam boat Atlantic, which left here a few days ago for Louisville. The news is that the cholera had broken out on board of that boat, and that several of the passengers had died, and the remainder had left her. We should be sorry to create an alarm, but we have within a few days heard of several cases that have terminated fatally.”

The Senate of the United States have, a second time, 30 to 11; rejected the government Bank Directors appointed by the President.

A letter from Louisville, of April 20th, says—“The Cholera is very bad in the river—a boat arrived here yesterday from New Orleans, lost 17 passengers, 8 of them cabin, and very respectable.—The steam-boat Philadelphia landed a detachment of the U. S. troops on the 20th—six of whom had been attacked, one since dead, and two dangerously ill. One of the passengers of the boat had also died of the cholera.”

The Columbus, Ohio, Journal states, that a severe frost which occurred in that part of the country on the 26th ult. destroyed all the fruit and many vegetables.

Frost, thick enough, it was apprehended, to injure the cotton plants, was experienced in Augusta, Geo 5th ult.

The printing office of the Commercial Advertiser, New York, in the old Phenix building, on the corner of Wall and Water streets, was totally consumed by fire on the night of the 30th ult.—three upper stories of the building was wholly consumed.

BY-LAWS FOR PILOTS!

1st.—That a Pilot shall in all cases behave himself civilly, and be strictly temperate, and sober, in the exercise of his Office, and shall use his utmost care and diligence for the safe conduct of every Ship or Vessel, while under his charge, and shall also be careful she does no damage to others, under a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

2nd.—That any Pilot who observes any of the Buoys driven away out of their place, shall forthwith send an account of the same to the Commissioners of Buoys, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

3rd.—That as the Pilot who first boards a Vessel is entitled by law to the preference of her pilotage; or if refused by the Master thereof to half pilotage; every Pilot shall board the nearest Vessel when more than one is in sight, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

4th.—That any Pilot who runs a Ship or Vessel aground while under his charge from negligence or mismanagement, on conviction, to pay a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, or be suspended as a Branch Pilot for such time as the Justices may deem proper.
