

to import Tea into the North American Colonies, at as low a price as it can be imported in the United States; though they cannot but express their regret, that a duty on Tonnage, and on Cargoes by British and Colonial Ships, should have been imposed for the support of the Consular Establishment at Canton. If it should be found that the local duties on Tea in the Colonies, should have the effect of encouraging its illicit introduction, the evil would no doubt be promptly remedied by the Colonial Legislatures, by the removal or reduction of the duties occasioning it.

Your Commi tea having received intimation, that in the progress of the pending negotiation, relative to the North East Boundary of the United States, a claim had been set up by that country, to a right of free Navigation of the River St. John, and a memorial on this subject to his Majesty's Government having been entrusted to them by the Committee of Trade, at Quebec, they deemed the matter of sufficient importance to solicit an interview upon it, with Mr. Secretary Stanley; when they were much gratified at receiving from the Right Hon. Gentleman, a frank and explicit declaration, that such claim had been pre-emptorily negatived by his Majesty's Government, and that instructions had been given to the Diplomatic Agents of this Country, not to allow of the subject being introduced into the negotiations, in any shape whatever. The proverbially insidious nature of American Diplomacy, which constantly takes for granted every point in their own favour, but carefully guards itself against conceding any similar points to their adversaries,

renders this manly determination of his Majesty's Ministers doubly gratifying to all who feel an interest in our valuable American Provinces; for injurious as the concession of such a claim on the River St. John would be to the Integrity of those Dominions, it is evident, that far from satisfying the Government of the United States, it would be only a step towards procuring the longer desired, and more highly prized navigation of the St. Lawrence; the concession of which would be as destructive of British Sovereignty in the Western Continent, as it would be advantageous to the United States.
