LATER.—We have also been very obligingly favored with Liverpool papers of the 12th and 14th May; brought by the *Woodman*, in 30 days from that port. The news respecting the amnesty between Don Miguel and Don Pedro, appears to be fully confirmed by the papers per this arrival, as will be seen below. Subjoined are extracts:

LONDON, May 12.—An express has arrived in the city from Plymouth, with the news that the African steamboat, has come from Lisbon with government despatches, announcing that Don Miguel has accepted terms, and is coming to England in the *Stag* frigate. All, therefore, is settled in Portugal. The Portuguese Bonds have improved 1 per cent.

The report of Don Carlos' embarkation for Liverpool is not confirmed by letters received to the 3d. On the contrary, it was then reported that Don Carlos contemplated an invasion of Spain on the South of the Tagus.

Seldom, if ever since the termination of the war, has the Medway assumed a more warlike appearance than at present. Three line of battle ships lie in Sheerness, in readiness to proceed to sea as soon as manned. The *Hastings*, 74, is only waiting for provisions to enable her to sail to Lisbon, to bear the flag of the Commander in chief; and the *Russell*, 74; has been ordered to be rigged and equipped for service with all possible despatch.

It is in contemplation that His Majesty will visit Portsmouth in June, and thence proceed to Ireland, on visit to the Earl of Shannon.

Captain Ross is likely to receive the extra remuneration for his services, which he demanded. The grant will be £5000.

TRADE.—In the colored and white Cloth-halls, Leeds, last week, the demand was limited, and the little business done was rather at reduced prices.

Rochdale flannel market last week was well attended by buyers, and much business was done, especially in middling qualities; some of which were sold at a little advance.

At Bradford, in wool there was a considerable activity, and a small advance of 10s per pack was obtained on some descriptions.

A reduction of nearly 10 per cent. or 4s per cwt. has taken place in the price of soap. The public will now certainly have the full benefit of the reduction of the duty.

Welsh butter is lower than it has been for many years. The very best quality will only fetch 6d. per lb; while middling and inferior sorts will only sell for 4-1-2 to 5d per lb. in casks.

About 9,300,000 ounces of silver, and about 6,000 ounces of gold, are annually converted into plate, and stamped at the Mint. The duty on silver at 1s 6d an ounce amounts to £70,000 a year, and on gold to £5,000.

As the corn laws in England do not prohibit, in express terms, the importation of bread, a great number of quarter loaves are made at Calais, and sent to London, where they are sold at 4-1-2 each.

The Dissenters.—At the great meeting of dissenting delegates in London last week, at which the strongest feelings of hostility against the established Church seem to have prevailed, the following was the first resolution.—Its language will admit of no equivocation,—it must henceforward be received as their motto:

That this meeting recognises the great and leading principle of full and complete separation of church and state, as the true basis on which equal rights and justice can be secured to all classes of his Majesty's subjects!!—*Liv. Courier.*

CHURCH PROPERTY.—On Friday night, upon the presentation of a petition from Walsall, Mr Stanley, hitherto the great champion of the Church in the Cabinet, denied that University property was Church property; and said that 'if its clergy persisted in their opposition to the rightful claims of the Dissenters, the establishment would become a practical grievance, and must be dealt with as such by the Legislature.' This is progressing!—*Liv. Albion.*

In the House of Lords, on the 12th May, the Lord Chancellor presented a petition from the dissenters of Glasgow, signed by 48,000 persons, praying for the dissolution of the connexion between Church and State. The Lord Chancellor did not coincide with the full prayer of the petition, and took occasion to express himself decidedly against the separation of Church and State.

The meeting of operatives held at Manchester, on Friday went off quietly, and in the proceedings there was nothing remarkable.

Two of the Hon. Company's largest ships, the London and the Canning, of 1400 tons each, were put up for sale on Wednesday, at Lloyd's. The first, with all her stores &c. was sold for £5,900 to Thomas Ward, Esquire; the second, with her stores &c., was sold for £5,670, to Joseph Soames, Esq.

Mr Jeffrey is to be the new Scotch Judge. Mr John Murray left town on Tuesday morning for the North; he will be the new Lord-Advocate.

Another fatal affray in the County of Limerick.—On Monday last, at the fair Croom, a riot, followed by an attack on the Police barracks, took place, when the police fired in self-defence, killing three men and one woman, and wounding seven.

Protestant Emigration.—The number of protestants who have emigrated from Ireland during the last few years is as follows:—In 1829, 12,000; in 1830, 21,000; in 1831, 29,500; in 1832, 31,500; making a total of 94,000 during the short space of four years!—*Dublin U. Mag.*

Rome under the barbarians, was sacked five times in the space of eight centuries. Under our public order, Lyons has been sacked twice in three years. We are progressing!—*French paper.*

A gentleman well known in London, has accumulated upwards of £20,000 in buying and selling horse-flesh, having, in fifteen years, slaughtered the immense number of 45,000 horses.

The Van Diemen's Land papers state that Colony to be laboring under too great a number of emigrants, and too great a scarcity of money.

The Manufacturers of France appear to have suffered severely in consequence of the late insurrection at Lyons.

MISCELLANEOUS.

In consequence of the recent arrangements, the East India Company are discharging most of their clerks and officers, to whom they allow one-third of their former salaries.

The London Times calculates that there are 50,000 thieves and pick-pockets in the metropolis.

Russia is positively to evacuate the principalities of Moldavia and Walachia; returning, however, on the Turkish side of the Danube, the important fortress of Silistria, as a guarantee for the payment of the four millions of ducats still due of the indemnity the Porte, by the treaty of Adrianople, agreed to pay to Russia.

The estimate of the damage done to Lyons during the disturbances is 10,000 fr. (£400) which appears moderate. This, it is thought, the city will have to pay.

The Court of Prussia has declined to receive General Goblet as ambassador from Belgium, regarding him as a deserter from the service of the King of Holland.

The charge of the national debt, which was in 1816, £33,472,210, was at the opening of the present year, £28,561,835. The principal of the debt has been reduced within the same period £78,188,057.

The Committee appointed to consider the claims of Captain Ross have agreed to recommend the grant. It is understood that there was a strong disposition in the Committee to appropriate a portion of the sum to Commander Ross, but all precedent was found to be against such a course.

We are happy to learn, (says a Scots paper,) from pretty good authority, that their Majesties William IV. and his Queen, have resolved on visiting Scotland this season. The Palace of Holyrood is already undergoing repairs for their reception.

M. Dorlodot, a glass manufactory, at Anzin, in France, has invented a species of glass tile, of great solidity and transparency, which it is thought may be substituted, with much advantage, in all cases where sky-lights are now employed.

The late Sir Harry Trelawney, Bart., who died at Rome last month, had been successively Methodist, Calvinist, and Roman Catholic, in which latter faith he died. He was in his 84th year.

An Austrian Bank, with a variety of Colonial Branches, is now forming in London, under the auspices of Capitalists of the highest character, which is likely to prove not only a profitable but a highly useful establishment. The common interest for money in Austria at the present moment is ten per cent.

In a late number of the Sydney Herald, we find the arrival of thirty moderately young and unmarried females in the colony from the mother country, in the ship *Edward Coulston*, notified with due ceremony, and the names of the ladies recorded at full length.

The Strathfieldsay, chartered by the Emigration Committee, was to sail from Gravesend on the 1st, with 290 young women! of good character, for Hobart Town, New South Wales, in search of husbands.

The Revenue of the Corporation of London is £127,000 per annum.

The petition of the Manchester Dissenters has been signed by nearly 30,000 individuals.
