CHOLERA.—We would call the attention of the Board of Health at this port, to the following paragraphs, which we copy from our latest English paper; and under our European head will also be found a most heart-rending account of the ravages of this destructive disease, which now prevails to a most frightful extent in Ireland. As this is a subject of vital importance to the Inhabitants generally, and fraught with much danger to the health of the settlements around, it deserves the most serious attention of the conservators of the public health, more especially at a season when the papers of the Mother Country announce that there will be a strong tide of Emigration flowing this spring from that quarter to the North American Colonies:

"We are happy to be able to announce the almost total cessation of the cholera in and about Clarina, in the neighbourhood of this city. Commencing at Patrick's well, where the mortality has been most severe, there being 84 deaths within a very short time, this awful disease extending through Clarina and the adjoining villages, where the exertions of Dr Brodie, the dispensary physician, who has been most successful in his treatment of it, has been, under Providence, arrested in its destructive progress. But of 29 cases occurring since the 7th inst., eighteen of whom were in collapse when visited, seven only have died. Blankets, warm clothing nutritious diet, have been supplied to the sufferers by a subscription raised in the Parish of Kilkenny, the scene of this visitation.—*Limerick Chronicle.*

"It is with extreme concern we have this day to state that Enniskillen has experienced another visitation of cholera. It appeared on the first instance after the fair of the 10th of this month, in some of the lodging houses in the east end of the town, to which quarter with few exceptions it is principally confined.

"We regret to learn from the town of Donegal, that cholera has appeared there with great violence, and that seven persons had fallen victims to it when our advices were dispatched."

Shipwreck, and loss of Lives.—The ship Caledonia, Capt. M-Lay, of St. John, N. B. sailed from Liverpool for this port on the 17th November last, with 43 passengers. After encountering violent head gales for 64 days, she arrived at Cork, with sails split and other damage. Having been refitted, the ship put to sea again on the 11th February, and on Wednesday last, at ten o'clock in the morning, struck upon the bar three miles from the shore, off Rockaway, and bilged. The passengers were carried ashore in the long boat until only three remained. These, with three of the crew, a boy and the captain, attempted to escape in the small boat, but just as the cap-

tain, last of all, was stepping into the boat, she was swamped by a sea, and although he immediately threw over ropes, only the boy was able to seize them, and the others, three passengers and three of the crew, perished. The ship was of 500 tons burden, and not quite two years old. The cargo consisted of salt, coals and slates. Both ship and cargo are a total loss. The ship is insured in Wall-street to the amount of \$18,000.—*New York Journal of Commerce.*

BY-LAWS FOR PILOTS.

1st.—That a Pilot shall in all cases behave himself civilly, and be strictly temperate, and sober, in the exercise of his Office, and shall use his utmost care and diligence for the safe conduct of every Ship or Vessel, while under his charge, and shall also be careful she does no damage to others, under a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

2nd.—That any Pilot who observes any of the Buoys driven away out of their place, shall forthwith send an account of the same to the Commissioners of Buoys, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

3rd.—That as the Pilot who first boards a Vessel is entitled by law to the preference of her pilotage, or if refused by the Master thereof to half pilotage; every Pilot shall board the nearest Vessel when more than one is in sight, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

4th.—That any Pilot who runs a Ship or Vessel aground while under his charge from negligence or mismanagement, on conviction, to pay a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, or be suspended as a Branch Pilot for such time as the Justices may deem proper.
