UNITED STATES.

MONTREAL GAZETTE. We noticed in our last the serious disturbances which had occurred in New York on the occasion of the charter election. We are happy to find from our subsequent accounts that no loss of life had actually occurred, and that the details in the papers formerly received, furnished as they apparently have been under the influence of the moment and during an unusual excitement, were much exaggerated. We shall endeavor to give an outline of the last day's events. In the morning, rioting had not taken place, except in two trifling instances, and the polling of votes went on briskly. The great majority were however foreigners in every sense of the word, who took out letters of naturalization at the Marine office and then voted as American citizens. At about noon, an attack was made upon the Whig or anti-Jackson party near the Masonic Hall, in which several persons were seriously injured and many carried to the hospital dangerously wounded. The citizens during this affray got into the Arsenal and obtained muskets, but did not carry them away. At half-past two the Mayor issued his proclamation announcing the restoration of peace, and that means had been effectually taken to prevent similar disturbances. Towards a later period of the day, things appeared more serious.—A Messenger was sent to the Navy Yard, to solicit the presence of a body of the United States Marines for the preservation of the peace. On application to the Commander, he said he would readily furnish a detachment, and head them himself, were it not that he had just sent them on board the Brandywine and Vincennes, in consequence of which they were no longer under his orders. Application was then made to the Commodore of the station, who declined interfering, stating that whatever his personal feelings might be, he did not deem himself authorized to do so. A request was also sent to Governor's Island, to the same effect.—A counter request was soon after sent, the Mayor having ordered out a body of Militia, who were stationed in different parts of the city to prevent disorder. Among those most seriously injured was a Captain Munson of the Watch, and his life still appears to be in a critical state. The call made upon the military was promptly obeyed and it was said 1200 men were under arms, the Infantry quartered at the Arsenal and the Cavalry at the City Hall. During the evening the Anti-Jackson printing offices (in Wallstreet) were converted into garrisons; the workmen, and others connected with the establishments, being armed with muskets and pistols. This was in consequence of some threats which had been thrown out. The great room of the Exchange was occupied by armed militia-men, and a strong force of watchmen were stationed in the neighbourhood. Demands had been very generally made during the day at all the gun-shops for pistols, probably in self defence. Thus closed these eventful three days, the like of which has never previously occurred in America, under its boasted free institutions, its numerous elections by the people and its ballot system.

During this memorable contest no less than 35,147 votes were taken, which it is said was a majority of 4621 over the number taken at any previous election. The result has been the election of the Jackson candidate Mr Lawrence, by a majority of 179, but some of the elections are about to be contested and hopes are yet entertained of Mr Verplank's election. The Aldermen elected are 9 Whigs to 6 Jacksonites, the assistant Alderman are 8 whigs to 7 Tories, or in joint ballot the opposition to General Jackson is 17 to 13.
