Colonial.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Pictou Mechanic & Farmer, Dec. 2.
The Township Election took place on Wednesday last. During the whole of the previous night, the deluded sons of the Mountain, true to the order of their gods, were flocking into the town; and at day-break they were as thick on the streets as the stars in the firmament of heaven. At the hour of polling, Mr. Hatton was nominated by a person from the Country, who had a piece of paper put into his hands with the nomination written thereon. This he was unable to read; but as his services were too valuable to be overlooked, Dr. Martin put the words into his ear, and they were at last successfully conveyed to the audience! Mr. Ross detailed at length his reasons for not offering. His principal object was to oppose another who he was led to believe might be nominated; but as that individual had been thrown overboard by the Tories, he declined a contest in which he had no well grounded prospect of success.

Halifax Novoscotian, Dec. 2.
Captain Peloso.—The testimonial which was subscribed for by the young men of Halifax, and which was ordered at the manufactory of Messrs. Rundell & Co. London, arrived by the Steamship Caledonia. It consists of a massive gold medal and chain, with suitable inscription, and enclosed in a splendid morocco box. The chain is very heavy, and of a marine pattern, and is connected to the medal by an elegantly formed gold anchor. The inscription, in English and Spanish, is as follows:

“Presented to Capt. Antonio Peloso, of Havana, by the young men of Halifax, as a Testimonial of their gratitude and esteem, for his Gallantry in Capturing the Pirates who murdered Capt. Cunningham and two seamen of the brig Vernon, near Cape Antonio, on the 15th day of May, A. D. 1840, and for his generosity towards their countrymen, the survivors of the crew of that vessel.
The cost of the testimonial is £50 sterling. It is creditable to all concerned and is a fine evidence that the young men of the town, can feel and exhibit spirit in the right manner. We know not whether any other acknowledgments have been forwarded to Captain Peloso. Such were spoken of, but we have not seen the reports in any tangible shape. The assurance that his risk and bravery, in rescuing two Nova Scotians from the fangs of Pirates, are properly appreciated, should not be confined to the young men of Halifax. They have done their duty.

NEW-BRUNSWICK.

St. John Courier.
Bank of British North America.—Mr. Edward Sancton of this city who has acted as First Teller in the Branch of this Bank since its establishment in St. John, has been appointed by the Court of Directors in London, to the situation of Accountant, in the place of Mr. George Taylor, who was recently appointed Manager of the Branch at Fredericton.

CANADA.

Montreal Herald, Nov. 10.
The British Government appears to be taking a lively interest in promoting the growth of Cotton in India, so as to be independent of the United States for a supply of that staple, and also to encourage the shipping interest—the right arm of Britain's supremacy on the seas. The great secret appears to be in the dressing of the India Cotton, and not in its quality, as has been satisfactorily tested in England by ten persons from South Carolina, who have been engaged by Captain Baynes of the Madras Army to proceed to India for the purpose of instructing the natives. They are to receive £300 per annum each.
If emigration to this country were properly encouraged, Canada would become a granary for England, which would thereby be independent of the continent of Europe, in case of a war or other contingency, besides paying for the grain in her own manufactures.
Australian Wool will soon supersede the importation of Saxony into England, and the growth of Assam Tea is rapidly increasing, and will, to a considerable extent, reduce the trade with China.
A judicious British Ministry might, in a short time, make their country independent of every foreign nation for every article of consumption, whether necessities or luxuries, by paying proper attention to the Colonies,

and thereby immeasurably increasing her power.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

United States.

New-York Corn Exchange, Nov. 25.—The receipts of Flour have been quite large, although rather free sales were making, and factors were quite willing to store, so much was constantly offered as to give the market a feeling of heaviness.

The stock in store at the close of business was estimated at 100,000 to 120,000 brls. The closing sales and in fact most of the sales through the week, were of Genesee at \$4 98 and \$4 94 for common and good brands, and \$5 for fancy.

Transatlantic Steam Ships.—We believe that we are at last enabled to announce the establishment of a New York line of steam ships between New York and England. The preliminaries are, we understand, nearly completed, and in a short time the keels of four gigantic vessels will be laid. They are to be about 2000 tons, with engines of 800 horse power. The construction and performance of the English steam ships have been narrowly and patiently investigated; and it is intended that the New York steam ships shall make the passage in ten days, on an average.

Arrival of Emigrants.—The number of persons who arrived in this country from foreign ports in 1839, was 76,000. Of these, 70,509 were foreigners: 34,000 from Great Britain and Ireland; 19,000 from Germany, and 7,000 from France. Of the number, 47,000 arrived at New York, 10,000 at New-Orleans, 6,000 at Baltimore, 3,000 at Philadelphia, and 3,080 at Boston: 143 were clergymen, and 154 physicians. The number which will be added to our population during the present year, will exceed 100,000. The emigration to this country in the next ten years will amount each year to a number sufficient to constitute a State.—New-Yorker.

Another Steam Boat Accident.—The steam packet Persian, Captain Goslee, met with a dreadful accident on the 7th instant, on her way from New-Orleans to St. Louis, by which forty persons were severely scalded, twelve of whom had died at the last accounts. In a letter from the captain dated at the mouth of the Arkansas river, Nov. 8th, he says:

We were hailed at Gouse's landing, about 7 miles below this place, to take in passengers. We sent the yawl ashore, and on its coming on board, we again started. The engine had not made but 5 or 6 revolutions when a flue collapsed in the outer boiler on the starboard side, killing five persons on the spot, viz: David Green, 1st engineer, who was on watch; John Williams, 2d mate, who had been ashore in the yawl; Oscar Crown, a black fireman, belonging to Mr. C. P. Billon, and two children, deck passengers. Two men who had jumped overboard, were drowned, there is another also missing, besides severely scalding 32 other persons of whom we have no hopes of more than 18 or 20.
