

called to New Brunswick and Canada, is deemed needful.

The causes of removing our garrison are traced by those who pretend to know all about the matter, to a design on the part of the Home Government, to punish 'Joe Howe and the Reformers' for the clamor which they have raised against Sir Colin Campbell, and to Sir John Harvey holding a military rank higher than any officer now here. Sir John is certainly a distinguished, deserving officer, but he is one of the youngest Major Generals in the Army List—having been promoted from the rank of Lieut. Colonel only upon his appointment to the Government of New Brunswick. A well informed authority in London—the United Service Gazette—who must necessarily be better informed of the intentions of the Government than any person here, in a spirit of bitter hostility to the Ministry, rather coarsely hints that an officer senior to Sir John Harvey will be put into employment on the removal of Sir C. Campbell.

CANADA.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—His Excellency the Governor General crossed over to the American side of the river Niagara, on Friday week, for the purpose of viewing the falls. He was received with every mark of attention, and spent an hour at the mansion of Governor Porter, previous to his return.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—Contrary to expectation, the Grand Jury returned a true Bill this day against T. M'Adam, for the wilful murder of Arthur Farquhar. This has given a new feature in the case, and will, most likely prevent Mr. M'Adam from getting out on bail. If this should turn out to be the case, he will have a chance of having his trial before the next Criminal Term, in March as the Grand Jury, in their Presentment to the Court, recommend the necessity of holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer, or the immediate discharge of a large number of prisoners who have been lying in gaol for long periods.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—Illness of Sir George Arthur.—I regret to inform you that Sir George Arthur is seriously indisposed. Late on Saturday night he had an attack of paralysis; three physicians are in attendance, and to day the symptoms are most favourable. I think the attack must have been sudden and unexpected.

8th.—The Lieutenant Governor is better. I understand he has attended to some official business to-day.

The Governor General was at Sandwich on the 1st inst. whence he crossed over to Detroit, and was introduced to Gov. Woodbridge.

Toronto Patriot, Sept. 11.

Yesterday, about 2 o'clock, as was announced, His Excellency the Governor General arrived in this city in H. M. Steamer Traveller, and landed at the Queen's Wharf.

His Excellency Sir George Arthur had previously directed that the Public Offices should be closed at 12 o'clock, to enable those in the several Departments to join the procession; and the Mayor issued his Proclamation, directing that the stores and public places of business be closed at 1 o'clock, in order that the inhabitants might also join in the public reception of His Excellency.

At the appointed hour, 1 o'clock, the ringing of the City Bells announced the approach of the Steamer, when the stores were immediately closed. His Excellency Sir George Arthur and Suite, the Heads of Departments, Clergy, Members of the Bar, City Corporation, St. George, St. Andrew, and St. Patrick's Societies,—the Hook and Ladder and Fire Companies,—and the citizens generally repaired to the Government wharf.

His Excellency and suite landed under a salute from the Royal Artillery, and proceeded along the wharf accompanied by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and suite, through a line formed by the city Corporation—the National Societies, and the Fire and Hook and Ladder Companies with their respective Banners, and the citizens who thronged the Banks and road side for nearly a mile, to the Parliament Buildings. The road the whole distance, from the Wharf to the Parliament House, and from thence to the Government House, was also lined on each side by her Majesty's 32nd and 34th Regiments—through which the cavalcade passed—the troops presenting arms as his Excellency advanced.

His Excellency proceeded amidst the cheers of the assembled multitude to the Legislative Council Chamber, when, after a short time, having come outside to the top of the steps, the Mayor read the Address from the inhabitants, to which his Excellency was pleased to make the Reply given below, which was received with thundering acclamations. His Excellency was escorted by Major McGrath's troop of Dragoons, which made a fine appearance.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable Charles Poulet Thomson, Member of Her Majesty's most Honorable Privy Council, Govern-

nor General in and over the British Provinces in North America, &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency: We, the Inhabitants of the City of Toronto, beg to congratulate your Excellency on your return to Upper Canada, and to renew the expression of our devoted loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's person and Government.

We entertain a high sense of Her Majesty's care for the welfare of her subjects in British North America, in having selected a Statesman of Your Excellency's superior attainments and abilities, to administer the government.

We beg further to express our concurrence in the declarations which your Excellency has made of the principles upon which the Government of the Colonies shall be conducted.

It has been a source of gratification to us, that your Excellency has personally visited the sister colonies of her Majesty on this continent, and that your Excellency has also made a tour through a great portion of this Province. In this we perceive an anxiety on the part of your Excellency to become acquainted with the position, climate, productions and resources of the several provinces, and from personal observation to ascertain, not only their value to the British Crown, but at the same time to learn the wants of the people.

We cannot permit the present opportunity to pass without expressing our thanks to your Excellency for the exertions which your Excellency has used in effecting these important changes in the regulation of the Post Office Department, and in the Tea Trade, as affecting these Colonies, which have recently been concurred in by the Home Government, at your Excellency's suggestion.

Since your Excellency's assumption of the Government of British North America, changes in the Constitution of this Province and of Lower Canada, have been effected, of such vital importance, as will materially influence our destinies. During the progress of these proceedings various opinions have agitated the public mind, and approbation or opposition has been freely and openly given, as the parties agreed to or dissented from the great questions under discussion.

The Imperial Parliament having enacted that a Legislative Union between Upper and Lower Canada shall take place, we trust that whatever may have been the opinion of individuals upon the policy of so vital and important a change in our condition, all classes of people in either Province, will, since our destinies have become united by the law of the land, bring into the discussion of all questions arising under this new condition of our affairs, that spirit of loyalty, unanimity, and good feeling, which are so essential to the prosperity of every country.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to thank you for your address, and I am anxious at the same time to convey to the Inhabitants of your city, my warm acknowledgements for the kind reception they have afforded me on my return to Toronto.

I receive with great satisfaction the expression of your concurrence in the principles upon which my administration of the affairs of these Provinces is conducted. These principles, opposed alike to the opinions entertained by extreme parties, I am determined firmly to maintain, and to exercise the power confided to me by the Queen, in accordance to what I feel to be the real interests of the people, and what I believe to be also the deliberate and well considered desire of the vast majority.

I am gratified to learn that the Fiscal Measures which I have felt it my duty to recommend, for the benefit of these Provinces, have met your approval. You may rely upon my omitting no opportunity of urging upon Her Majesty's Government or the Imperial Parliament, any measures falling under their control, which may conduce to the advantage or improvement of the Canadas.

I have indeed derived the greatest pleasure from my visit to the various districts of Upper Canada. It has afforded me the means of making myself personally acquainted with different parts of the province, and will I trust enable me to advance their interests; but, above all, that visit has been most gratifying to me, as it has amply shown the feelings of the great majority of the inhabitants,—their desire to conciliate differences,—their determination to address themselves to the real interests of the country,—and the confidence they are pleased to repose in the humble but honest exertions which I have made, and shall continue to make, for the improvement of this portion of her Majesty's dominions. I trust that the Inhabitants of Toronto will emulate the general feeling of the Province by discarding violent party and personal feeling, and lend their willing assistance in the great work which is before us.

Confident in the support of the people, whom I believe no less sincerely desirous of attention to their practical interests than they are opposed to renewed agitation upon theoretical points of governments, I shall pursue the measures which appear to me calculated to promote the prosperity and advance the interests of the Colony, and my utmost ambition will be gratified, if through the blessing of Almighty Providence, I can see these fine Provinces take that station in the mighty empire of Great Britain, to which they are justly entitled.
