ARRIVAL OF THE MAIL.
The Courier with the Southern Mail
arrived here on Friday night, at 10
o'clock.

EUROPEAN NEWS.
On Tuesday morning last, we obtained
files of British papers to the 4th of this
month, by the Acadia, Steamer, which
vessel arrived at Halifax on the evening
of the Thursday previous, and furnished
in our last, a summary of the principal
items of news, as well as copious extracts.
Since that time, we have had leisure
to peruse these papers more carefully,
but find nothing of moment to announce
in addition to what we have already laid
before our readers.

Under the head of the British Journals,
we have copied several articles on vari-
ous affairs which now agitate the public
mind; and under the European head,
have given a number of articles of a mis-
cellaneous description.

INQUESTS.
The following Inquests were held be-
fore Martin Cranney, Esq., one of the
Coroners of the County, at Mr. John
Wyse's, Douglastown.

On view of the Body of HUGH Mc-
WILLIAM, who was missing since Octo-
ber 1839, whose remains were found on a
meadow, up Green Brook, by an Indian
who was hunting. Nothing was elicited
on the Inquest to lead the Jury to sup-
pose that any violence had been used.
They accordingly found that the said
Hugh McWilliam was found dead, but
how or by what means, no evidence ap-
pears to the Jury.

Also, on the same day and place, on
view of the body of EDWARD McLAY, a
sailor belonging to the Brig John, of
Belfast, who fell off the yard and was
drowned.—Verdict found drowned.

DEATH OF THE PRINCESS AUGUSTA.
The following announcement of the
death of the above named Princess, we
extract from the Frederick Gazette of
Wednesday last.

HERALD'S COLLEGE, September 21, 1840.
The Earl Marshall's Order for a General Mourn-
ing, for Her late Royal Highness
the Princess Augusta Sophia.

In pursuance of Her Majesty's commands,
these are to give public notice, that, upon the
present melancholy occasion of the death of
Her late Royal Highness the Princess Augusta
Sophia, her Majesty's Aunt, it is expected
that all persons do put themselves into Mourn-
ing; the said Mourning to begin on Sunday
next, the 27th instant.

Downing Street, September 28, 1840.

Sir,—It has become my melancholy duty to
communicate to you the intelligence of the de-
cease of Her Royal Highness the Princess Au-
gusta Sophia, which event took place at Cla-
rence House, St. James' Palace, on the 22d in-
stant.

THE CARROT.
We believe that hitherto in this Pro-
vince, this valuable root has only been
raised in gardens. It is with much plea-
sure we can now state the following
facts, shewing its successful cultivation
in the open field. On the farm of that
enterprising agriculturist Henry Cunard,
Esq., we last week had the gratification
of witnessing that on a space of ground,
not exceeding one third of an acre, there
was being dug such a crop of carrots, as
speaks volumes in favour of the capabili-
ties of our Miramichi soil. The quanti-
ty raised on the above space of ground
was Eighty barrels. The greater num-
ber of the carrots were of an extraordi-
nary size, some of them being twenty-six
inches in length, and thirteen and a half
in circumference. Several of these were
found to weigh not less than from two
and a half to three pounds. Such state-
ments should certainly stimulate others
to try the experiment so successfully
made by Mr. Cunard.—It is perhaps not
generally known that Carrots are highly
beneficial in the feeding of horses and
other animals.
