**Dorchester to Chatham.**—Leave Dorchester for Miramichi, every Monday and Friday, at 5 o'clock, A. M.; Smith's, at Shediac, at Nine; Keswick's, Buctouche, at Nine; Richibucto, at 3 o'clock, P. M.; Kouchibouguac, at Six; Dickens's, at half past Seven: Donald M'Beath's, Black River, at Nine; and arrive at Chatham by Ten, the same evening.

**To and from Chatham and Bathurst.**—Leave Chatham for Bathurst, the following morning after the arrival of the Southern Stages, and arrive in the Evening of the days on which they start. Leave Bathurst for Chatham, on the mornings of Tuesday and Saturday.
