The bear soon dropped the mangled lamb and fled, whilst the owner of it pursued it with the dogs which came to his assistance to a small lake into which he plunged, when another charge of shot was fired at his head, at which the creature scratched his pate a little and took no more notice of it than if it had been a mere box on the ear; but leaving the water he now took to the woods, Mr Foshay still pursuing him with men and boy. Another load was now discharged, when suddenly the beast turned upon his pursuers and seizing poor Paddy was beginning to hug and scratch him in a frightful manner. Mr. Foshay perceiving that unless he hurried to his relief the son of the Emerald Isle would inevitably be sacrificed, ran up and caught the animal by his hind leg to pull him off, when the bear flew upon him, but with herculean grasp he caught the monster by the throat and with a desperate effort held him till Master Stark slipping a knife from Mr. Foshay's pocket, with which providentially he was supplied, thrust it into the animal's throat, when uttering some hideous groans he expired. The poor Hibernian, though he received some rather severe wounds, is likely soon to be well enough for another Bear hunt, though I think neither he nor his Master will be disposed for another engagement without having something more than gudgeon shot to attack these formidable beasts of the forest.

United States.

Boston, September 19.—Maine Election.—All the accounts from this state seem to confirm the news of a Whig triumph at the election on Monday last. There is no longer any doubt that Edward Kent, has been chosen Governor by a majority of 6 or 700 over General Fairfield. In the Senate 17 or 18 Whigs (of the 24) are elected. There is also a Whig majority in the house. Of the Members to Congress the Whigs are known to have elected four, and another (Mr Noyes) probably, out of 18. The Great Western Rail Road from Boston to Albany, is progressing rapidly. Not less than 2,000 men are employed upon it, in some sections, both day and night. When this is completed, the struggle for the business will produce a competition between the cities of Boston and New York.
