Port Hood, Dec. 11.—The three masted schr. Novelty, belonging to Messrs. J. Cunard & Co. of Miramichi, bound to Cork, experienced very severe weather in the Gulf, carrying away her rudder and best bower anchor. They then get out sweeps, and expecting by this means to be able to get into the Gut of Canso. From the unmanageable character of the vessel she drifted off Mabou, when the crew worn down by suffering and fatigue, were running her on shore—considering it better, by this course, to save the cargo and materials than to abandon her afloat. Mr. Tremain still determined not to give her up while in sight of the harbour, proceeded, netwithstanding the surf, to unload her. After working incessantly day and night for some time, with almost incredible labor and fatigue, the weather being severe, they succeeded in time, with almost incredible labor and fatigue, the weather being severe, they succeeded in getting all the deals on shore. They then attempted to get her into the river, and after the most strenuous efforts were successful. The vessel and cargo are both in a place of safety. The saving of the vessel is wholly owing to the almost unparalleled exertions of Mr. Tremain, who was ever present assisting at the work, and using the utmost efforts to prevent the labourers, worn down by their protracted labour and the severity of the wear ther, from giving up in despair .- Cape Breton
