

FROM ENGLISH PAPERS.

An island has been discovered between the Cape of Good Hope and Australia, in which there are valuable coal mines.

**Shocking Affair at Liverpool.**—On Thursday morning, Mr Wm. Genner, a cotton broker, residing in Roscommon-street, in a fit of insanity, shot his wife and one of his sons in the head, and was about to shoot another son and himself, when the lad escaped and gave the alarm. Mr Jenner is about 60 years of age. The son was killed on the spot, and his wife dangerously wounded.

A woolen manufactory at Rochford, belonging to Messrs. Butterworth, of Summer Castle, was destroyed by fire on the 26th ult. Loss estimated at £30,000.

It has been arranged that the port of arrival and departure for the British Queen from and to New York, will in future be Liverpool instead of London.

**Splendid Dress for the Queen.**—A dress is making in Bethnal Green for the Queen to wear at the ball in May, for the encouragement of the British silk manufacture. The pattern is a rich white satin ground splendidly brocaded with gold, the brocade representing the oak-leaf with sprigs of the leaf interspersed, and the acorn attached. It will be a most costly piece of workmanship, as there is a large quantity of gold woven on the satin, which measures thirty yards. The machinery on which it is formed is upon a new principle; and it takes a whole day to make three quarters of a yard. The same pattern will be generally adopted by the lady patronesses of the ball; only that the gold is reserved for the leaves on the Royal dress alone. The weavers announce a new invention, which is to produce portraits of the Duke of Wellington and the Queen Dowager in black and white silk, so admirably done as to be scarcely distinguishable from a painting.—Colonial Gazette.

**China.**—From a return moved for by Mr Herries, it appears that the total sum which had been expended by the East India Company on account of the expedition against China, to be repaid by her Majesty's government, at the latest period for which the sum can be ascertained was £625,283 7s 9d, of which £150,000 has already been paid.

**The Duke of Wellington.**—It is a remarkable circumstance, that in no instance of the 'order department' of this illustrious warrior, does the word 'if' occur. The Duke looked forward to victories and not defeats. His Grace eschewed 'ifs,' and where it might have been used by other men, applied the word 'will' in giving his orders. The hero was always particular in small matters—his method of comprehension was great. On one occasion, Lieutenant Smith, who was at most of the Peninsular wars, as well as at the battle of Waterloo, says that when any fort was to be taken by storm or otherwise, the gallant Duke would say—'Major — or General — will take such a place,' and if there was not sufficient force to accomplish the object, a reinforcement would be sent. In one instance, where a small bridge had not been noticed (70 miles from head quarters) Lieutenant Smith says he was ordered by the Duke to proceed immediately to the spot, and report the length and breadth thereof.

We hear that General Hamilton has concluded a contract with the Paris house of Lafitte & Co. for the Texian loan.—Morning Post.

The dispute of France with Morocco has been settled by mutual concessions. The Governor of Mogadore has been dismissed; and the French consul, M de Laporte, has been recalled.

The Earl of Belmore died on Sunday at Leamington Spa. His Lordship, who was in his 67th year, was an Irish peer, and one of the representatives of the Irish peerage in the House of Lords. He was also Custos Rotulorum of the county of Tyrone, for which place his second son, the Hon H. Corry sits in parliament.

We regret to state that a report prevails of the loss of the Beagle surveying vessel, with all hands on board. By the latest accounts from Trincomalee, the report was current at the place.—Naval and Military Gazette.
