

force by force, and the city may suffer terrible injury.

In another, dated the 20th March, he says—

A suspension of hostilities at Canton and in this province has been this day agreed upon between the Imperial Commissioner Yang and the undersigned.

It has further been publicly proclaimed to the people under the seals of the Commissioner and the acting Governor of the Province, that the trade of the Port of Canton is open, and that British and foreign merchants who may see fit to proceed there for the purpose of lawful commerce, shall be duly protected.

These are the most important facts in the proclamations of Captain Elliot.

(From the Calcutta journals)

By the Queen Steamer, having on board Sir Gordon Bremer, which left Canton on the 31st of March, and Singapore on the 10th of April, we have the following China news:—The British flag flies over the Factory at Canton, and a provincial government has been established on the part of the Chinese, and some ships were receiving teas. The frigate Calliope and the Madagascar steamer were lying off the factory at Canton, but the English could not with safety venture on shore. Some people belonging to the Calliope having been seized while on shore, the Madagascar opened her fire on the city and the boat of the Calliope discharging grape, killed a great number of the Chinese, and eventually the prisoners were released. The Emperor is still issuing furious edicts.

It is understood that Sir J. G. Bremer is come up for troops and orders. Kesheh has been sent up to Peking in irons by the order of the Emperor. It is supposed this will have a good effect, as Kesheh will be able to open the Emperor's eyes as to the real state of affairs below.

Two officers of his Majesty's ship Blenheim had fallen into the hands of the Chinese, Capt. Elliot had demanded their release, but the result was not known. The Pestonjee Bomanjee had gone to Chusan with stores. On her arrival, the captain was stoned to death by the Chinese. The Columbine had gone to inquire into the matter and seek satisfaction.—Eng. April 20.

Canton is in possession of the British troops; and a truce had been agreed upon between the new commissioner and Captain Elliot; the trade is to be re-opened at Canton, pending the imperial decision. The commodore, however, has given notice that in permitting ships to proceed to Whampoa, all consequence arising from the possible and sudden resumption of hostilities, of course remain at the risk of the parties. Our friends say that this arrangement will succeed better than those hitherto attempted, but this seems doubtful.

Another letter says, 'All the factories in Canton are occupied by our troops. The Chinese villagers render every assistance in their power to the steamer Nemesis, in removing stakes and other obstructions in the river, between Macao and Canton.'—Hur. April 20.

INDIA.

The Panjab.—The Panjab still continues to be the theatre of dissension and bloodshed. Three Europeans holding high ranks in the Sikh army have been murdered by discontented and mutinous soldiery. Their names are Ford, Foulken, and Monton, the two latter Frenchmen, and the former an Englishman, and one paymaster of her Majesty's 16th foot. There appears to be good reason for supposing that the discontented nobles at the court of Lahore are endeavouring to compass the death of Shere Sing. By the latest intelligence from that place it seems the Maharajah was taking an excursion on the river, and that the boat in which he was embarked foundered without any apparent cause. This could only have occurred through treachery on the part of his attendants. Shere Sing, however, succeeded in swimming to the shore. The whole of his suite were also saved with the exception of one Sirdar, who has not since been heard of.

Scinde and Afghanistan.—Nothing of importance has occurred since the despatch of the overland mail. Major Todd has arrived in safety at Candahar. There are various reports in circulation as to the propriety of his conduct in so hastily quitting Herat. Some of the Calcutta Journals state that the Governor General considers him to have been too precipitous and is therefore much displeased. This is however mere rumour. A large portion of the Bombay troops have advanced through the Bolan pass. The head-quarters under Major

General Brooks, arrived at Quetta on the 2nd ultimo, and will remain there until the receipt of further instructions from Lord Auckland. A few weeks will therefore determine whether Herat is to be left to the care of Shah Kamram and his minister Yar Mahomed, or to be held by a British garrison. The adoption of the latter measure would certainly be the most effectual means of destroying the Persian influence in that quarter. The young Khan of Khelat is still amongst his own people. The political authorities notwithstanding their repeated disappointments are still in immediate expectation of his surrendering himself.

Ceylon.—Sir Colin Campbell arrived in Ceylon on the 6th ultimo, and was immediately proclaimed Governor of that Island. On the 7th the Right Honourable Stewart M'Kenzie embarked in the Seaforth steamer for Bombay. He arrived here on the 16th, and proceeds this day to Suez.

ABYSSINIA.

It is stated in the India papers that a secret expedition is about to be despatched by Earl Auckland (St.) to the Red Sea, to counteract the intrigues of the French in Abyssinia. A cruiser is to keep up communication with the expedition and Aden.

PERSIA.

The intelligence via India is pacific. It is said that the British agent was about to return to Bushire and amicable relations were to be renewed on the basis of a treaty by which the British will consent to evacuate Karrack, and the Shah cede the fort Gorion to Shah Kamram, and arrest his expedition to Herat. These stipulations are doubted, and it is not thought that Karrack will be given up.

SPAIN.

Madrid letters of the 26th state that the ministry was beaten in the Chamber of Deputies in the election of a vice president in place of M. San Miguel, named Minister of war; have elected M. Buriel, in lieu of M. Costna, the candidates of the ministry and the Unitarians, by 79 to 42. The ministerial candidate was thus defeated.
