

and his Excellency proceeds this evening to pay the last sad duties to his deceased father.

Frontiers of Turkey, May 15.—According to accounts from Belgrade it is proposed again to remove the seat of the Servian government to Belgrade, where Prince Michael is daily expected, though the inhabitants of Kragojewatz have remonstrated against it. Letters from Nissa complain of the scarcity of provisions, and the probability of a famine. The main road to Constantinople is indeed free, but no one ventures to travel by it without a strong escort, at least from Nissa to Alexinizza. It is reported that the troubles have now really extended to Rumelia, and that in the neighborhood of Bitoglia there have been dreadfully sanguinary affrays between the Turks and Christians, in which the former lost many men. According to accounts from Candia, received in Constantinople, the number of the insurgents in that island had increased to 16,000 men, and it is feared that the concession of the Porte would come too late. The mountaineers of Syria who contributed so much to reconquer that country appear to be more and more adverse to the Turkish government. They had looked for rewards which they have not received. But how should the Porte satisfy every body? Its financial distress daily increases, and the indemnity to be paid to the allied powers, for the expenses of the war has not yet been thought of.

Trieste, May 19.—The steam boat which has arrived to-day brings no news of importance. At Alexandria the hattis cheriff for the regulation was expected, but, as we learn from Constantinople by letters of the 6th, the sending of it had been delayed by the troubles in Bulgaria which required all the attention of the Porte; for the same reason the Consuls-General had deferred their departure for Alexandria. Other accounts from Constantinople of the same date state that tranquillity is restored in the districts of Nissa, Sophia, and Phillipoli; that is after 60 villages had been totally destroyed by the Albanians. Captain Zenovich reports that he met in the Sea of Marmora with the Turkish squadron which is to blockade the island of Candia. It consists of a ship of the line under Admiral Tahir Pacha, a corvette, a steam boat, and 18 transports.
