

for Hanrahan, 1251. After the close of the poll, Pendergast's party, in returning to Harbor Grace, many of them were severely beaten and injured.

Mr. Ridley, when on his way to Carbonear, this morning, in endeavouring in his character of Magistrate, to suppress a riot on the Bench, was knocked down by a man who struck him a tremendous blow with a picket on the back of the head, and lay for some time in a state of insensibility. On examining the injury, it was discovered that his skull was fractured, and his life is considered in danger. This was the more wanton and unprovoked, as Mr. R. had taken no part whatever in the contest.

Many other depredations of a minor character have also been committed.

In addition to this we have been informed, on good authority, that the house of Mr Ash at Carbonear being assailed, he fired from his window and wounded five or six of the depredators; on which his house was fired by the mob and burnt down to the ground.

The Civil authority in Conception Bay having been declared to be totally insufficient for bringing the offenders to justice, it was decided at a Council held yesterday, that a detachment of 100 men of the Royal Veteran Companies should proceed thither to aid in effecting this object. A vessel has been hired and will proceed with the troops under the command of Major Law, as soon as practicable; and we have only to express our hope, that those who have wantonly outraged the laws, may be brought to atone to the Country for their nefarious misdeeds.

The election of course is a nullity, and we understand that for the present at least, no new writ will be issued.

WEST INDIES.

The Legislature of Tobago have passed a bill appropriating the sum of £30,000 for the purpose of emigration, to be raised by an issue of notes to the extent of £10,000 per annum, and bearing interest to the rate of six per cent.—the same to be raised by a land tax of 4s. upon each cultivated acre.

St. Lucia.—This island both physically and morally, seems to be in the most deplorable state. In its crops it has fallen off enormously. Estates which even in 1838, shipped 130 hogsheads of sugar, having finished this year with 40. Better hopes, however, are entertained of the future. 'As regards coffee,' (continues our authority) it is generally admitted that it will be a complete failure this year.

But turning to the political aspect of affairs, we find things if possible still worse.

Trinidad.—By a return of the produce shipped in each of the last seven years, we observe that the falling off even in this new and fertile colony, has averaged upwards of 1500 hogsheads sugar,—the amount exported in 1834 being 25,400 hogsheads—that in 1840 on 15,700. The deficiency for the last year is 2,000. In the cocoa and coffee crops, however, there appears to have been very little variation.

The number of emigrants arrived during the past month, September, was 102—making the whole number from the 1st of January, 2,408.

CHINA.

The ship Leon, which sailed from Macao on the 12th of July, has arrived at Newport. The following letters was sent to the editors of the Times and Star, New York: MACAO, July 11th, 1840.

I send you two papers, (not come to hand) and refer you to their contents thinking that you will find something of interest to communicate to your readers. The export of tea, &c. to Europe is, I think important, and I would send you the total export of the same to America, but as yet I am uncertain in regard to two ships. Thus far I make it to be since July 1st. 1839, 278,000 but think you may add with safety 10,000, making total 288,000 chests of all descriptions. At any rate, per the next ship, I will send it to you, correctly made up.

There are still some Americans at the city of Canton, but they must soon be off. Two American ship inside, also the Panama of New York, and one of the white washed craft, called formerly the Malcolm, then the Alabama, and now Kosciusko. They will be obliged to lay out the blockade, as they went in after it was declared, and of course are prizes if they attempt to come out.

The Merchant, Adelaide, and Washington, Americans, were brought to by the Hyacinth at the Bogue, and sent to Cape Sing Moon, and as yet are not released, but will be, without doubt, their papers being all correct.

The two men of war at the Bogue are the

Volage 28, and Hyacinth 18, and the Druid 44, is at Cape Sing Moon, with the Chinese, prizes.

The Larne, sloop is stationed off this port and has lightened her draught of water, that she may go into the Tyra in case of a typhoon or to the Inner Harbor, if the Chinese attempt to trouble Macao. All is quiet here, and I trust will remain so, but should not be astonished if we were attacked at any moment.

The squadron has gone up the coast, it is supposed, but no one knows certain. I imagine more is known in America in regard to the intentions of the English in this part than we know here, although on the spot. The Madagascar steamer went up the other day and we hope to hear on her return, as to where the troops, &c. are landed, and on her arrival I will communicate to you, as about that time there will be an opportunity.

I have written in great haste as the Lion has her topsails at the mast, and the Captain waits for this.

We learn that the bark Valparaiso, was at Copping Moon, July 11th, waiting the arrival of the overland mail from Bombay then hourly expected.

The Blockade was expected to continue from 12 to 18 months—on what grounds we know not.

Total export of teas to Great Britain to July 11, was 28,712,929 lbs. and 2572 bales raw silk.

Several English merchants were preparing to leave Macao and expect to be able to procure building lots on the island of Chusea, which they confidently expected would soon be in possession of her Majesty's forces, and be permanently held as one of her Majesty's colonies.
