

do if they can help it. From Glasgow, we are told, that the accounts of the destitution of the people exceed all belief, and that on a late occasion, when a charitable gentleman distributed amongst them a few loaves, they could be likened to nothing but a band of hungry wolves seizing a very insufficient prey. God protect the commonwealth! for our rulers, we greatly fear, will drive the people to desperation."

Our papers also furnish particulars of serious riots which have occurred in Galway, Clare, and Ennis, in Ireland, originating in the destitution of the people, produced by the want of employment and high price of the necessaries of life. In the last named town, the police fired on the people, by which two of the rioters were killed and several wounded.

The tariff had passed through committee of the House of Commons. Sir Howard Douglas, after a most admirable speech, moved an amendment—"that the duty on and after October next on Foreign timber, shall be 30s. and on deals 38s. both per load; and that the ulterior duty of 25s. contemplated in the proposed measure, shall not take place." It was lost without a division. Next week we shall publish the remarks of the worthy Baronet; their length precludes the possibility of our doing so to-day.

The trial of Francis for high treason took place on the 17th. He was found guilty, and sentenced to death.

There is some important news from India: The celebrated Khyber Pass was forced by the troops under the command of General Pollock, on the 5th of April, the British contending against a very superior force. Sir Robert Sale had made a very successful sortie from Jellalabad, and completely routed Akbar Khan; burnt his camp, and captured several pieces of ordnance. Colonel Palmer had surrendered the fortress of Ghuznee, and immediately after the troops evacuated it, they were inhumanly massacred, notwithstanding a solemn engagement had been entered into that they should be spared. The Governor General had ordered that courts martial should be held on Col. Palmer for the surrender of this strong hold, and on General Elphinstone for the disasters at Cabul.

There is some news from China, but it is not important.

THE SEASON.

AMID the great distress which prevails in the mother country, it is matter of great thankfulness that a kind Providence has so far blessed the labours of the husbandman, that the accounts from all parts of the United Kingdom and particularly from Ireland, represent the weather as being most delightful, and the appearance of the crops highly cheering.

Our papers from the United States, state that the crops, particularly of wheat, in the southern and western states, as most abundant; but the season in the north and east, is represented as being very cold and backward. Montreal and Quebec papers make the same complaint: the weather here is the finest we ever witnessed, and the crops, particularly grain, promise a rich return.

Steamer John M'Adam.—Charlottetown papers state, that Mr Longworth, the agent sent to Britain by the Steam Navigation Company, had arrived just in time to prevent the sailing of the above named vessel. She is represented as being old and too large for the purpose. Mr L. has gone to the Clyde, where he understood a boat was on sale, answering the description required by the company.

The Governor General arrived at Quebec on the 25th ult. where he was received with every demonstration of respect, befitting the representative of our most gracious Sovereign. He does not intend to pay Halifax a visit.

EMIGRATION.—A large portion of our mechanics and labouring population have left the place, since the opening of the navigation; to seek for employment which they have been unable to procure here, from the depressed state of trade.

United States.—At a very numerous meeting of the Whigs in New York, on the 22nd ult., Henry Clay, of Kentucky, was nominated as a candidate for the next Presidential chair.

A duel has taken place between the Hon. T. F. Marshall, and J. W. Webb, Editor of the New York Courier and Enquirer. They fought with pistols, at ten paces, and at the second fire Mr Webb received his adversary's ball in the right leg, a little below the knee.

BOUNDARY QUESTION SETTLED.—The Editor of the St. John Mirror of Saturday last, states, that he had obtained the Boston Bee of the 7th inst., which says that a treaty for the settlement of the North Eastern Boundary Question, has been settled with Great Britain. It gives no particulars.

The same paper states, that a boat containing sixteen persons, passengers, who had recently arrived in the Silks, worth, from Cork, while coming on shore in the long boat, came in contact with the ferry boat, there being a fog at the time, and upset, and nine of the passengers were drowned.

NOVA SCOTIA.—The citizens of Boston have forwarded to the Hon. UNITED STATES.—The Rhode Island War has again been put an end to by the government forces having attacked the camp of the rebels, and put them all to flight. A number of field-pieces and muskets were taken by the Government party. The rebel leader, Dorr, has escaped, and a reward has been offered for his apprehension.
