Singular Discovery.—The following facts have been made known to us, by a gentleman of this city, who had his information from the best authority, viz: Captain Darby, senior governor (as he is called), of Sable Island. For the last twenty-five or thirty years there has been a large mound, or pyramid of sand about one hundred feet high, on the Island, and not very far from the residence of Capt. Darby. The winds for some years have been gradually diminishing its height, and after a severe blow some few weeks since, it was completely blown away; and singular to say, a number of small houses built of the timbers and plank of a vessel were quite visible, on examination they were found to contain a number of articles of furniture and stores, put up in boxes, which were marked '43d Regiment;' the boxes or cases were perfectly rotten, and would not admit of their being removed. A brass dog collar was, however, discovered by Capt. Darby, with the name of 'Major Elliott, 43d Regiment' on it, and which Captain Darby brought to the city and presented to Major Tryon, who belongs to the 43d Regiment.—Halifax Herald.

Capt. Darby has endorsed this extraordinary announcement. Addressing the Editor of the Herald, on Wednesday, he says:

The houses were appearing at the base of a hill about two miles long, and 60 or 70 feet high, laying parallel with the south coast of the Island, the eastern end of which hill is about 55 feet high, covered with grass and other vegetation, about 35 feet below the surface, and 23 feet above the level of the sea; these houses appear as the sands were away with the action of the winds. There appeared at times, numerous bullets of lead; a great number of military shoes, parts of bales of blankets, and cloths, brass points of swords scabbards, bees wax, a small convex glass on both sides, a copper half penny of George II, dated 1749, some military brass buckles, a great number of brass paper pins, a very small dog's brass collar, with Major Elliott, 43d Regiment, engraved on it; numerous bones, some whole, and some broken, with the scalp of hair or head dress of a young female; with a piece of gold band. There are three buildings, which seem to have been constructed of the fragment of some ship, they are situated about 10 feet apart in a triangular form, and are 10 or 12 feet square.

Pictou Mechanic & Farmer, Aug. 24.

The Farmers in this part are all engaged harvesting. The wheat stalks are short, but the heads are remarkably full,—a great yield is anticipated. Accounts from all quarters speak well of the Crops; throughout the United States they are exceedingly fine.

The weather, of late, has been highly favourable to those persons engaged in Farming; better could not be desired to bring forward the fruit, vegetables, &c.

Vessel Burnt.—A vessel was burnt on the stocks, at Wallace a few days since—the property of Mr. McKay. She was insured for £1000.

Emigrants.—The Sydney Free Press notices the arrival at that port, of 360 emigrants, from Stornaway—all in good health and spirits. Two other vessels were expected from the same port.

Emigration.—Up to July 30th, the number of Emigrants arrived at Quebec was 30,127, being 13,349 more than to the same period last year. It is stated that 11,002 have come to Toronto, and 5000 settled in the Home District.

WEST INDIES.

From the Bermudian.

Shocks of Earthquake have been alarmingly rife in the islands. St. Christopher's, Nevis, St. Bartholomew's, Antigua and Trinidad, have all been affected. The walls of the Jail and House of Correction at Antigua were rent by two severe shocks felt there on the 24th June.—The Countess of Elgin, Lady of the Governor of Jamaica, was so seriously ill at our last advices, that her life was despaired of.—Barbadoes has unfurled the Temperance flag. A meeting was held in Bridgetown on the 22d June, at which a numerous assemblage of ladies and gentlemen was present. The platform was occupied by

the clergy, and gentleman connected with the Legislature and Magistracy of the Island. Interesting addresses were delivered, and some signatures obtained. We have much pleasure in noticing this movement of the good people of Barbadoes.

The Royal Mail Steam Packet Thames, had arrived from Nassau, N. P., on the 25th. She took on board 75 tons of coal, and departed the same day, at 6 P. M. for England. The Thames had 22 passengers. She had specie and freight to the amount of one Million of Dollars.

The Teviot, another of the Mail Packets arrived on the day following. She is commanded by Lieut. Croker, R. N. The Teviot received 95 tons of coal, and started on the homeward voyage at 9 P. M. She had seven passengers. This is the vessel which was reported destroyed by fire.
